

LANDSLIDE PERILS

FRENCH VILLAGE

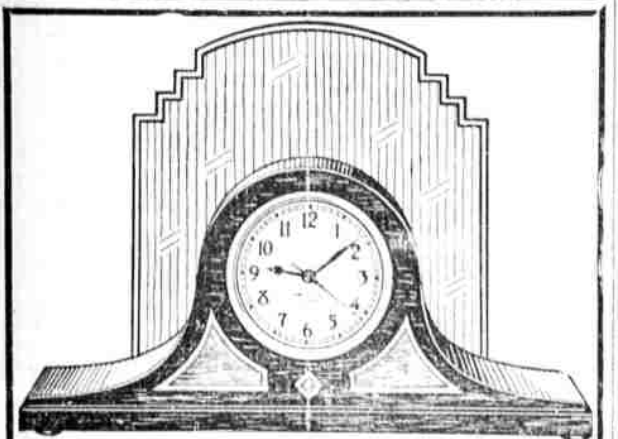

CHAMBERY, France, March 13.—Government engineers today attempted to divert an enormous landslide which was bearing down upon the picturesque village of Le Chateaufort at the rate of 500 feet an hour after engulfing Berges and Michaud.
The landslide, brought on by the excessive rainfall of the past few weeks, broke loose from the hill side with a loud rumbling and crashing, and moved downward with 750 acres of about 100 acres. Its volume was estimated at 200,000,000 cubic feet.
The engineers ordered the 125 inhabitants to move out of Le Chateaufort, which is well known to tourists who visit Aix-les-Bains. There were no casualties in either Berges or Michaud.
Another slide, of about 1,000,000 cubic feet, blocked a road near Montiers-Tarentaise.
The residents of the hillside, warned of the approaching slide, drove off their cattle and pets and left their homes. Twelve houses composing the hamlet of Michaud were swallowed in the moving mass. Walnut trees for which the region was famous, toppled over and were engulfed along with barns and dwellings.
Engineers believed they would be able to divert the movement to a mountain torrent whose bed probably will absorb some of the moving matter. It was expected tonight to blow on the bridge at Granges in an effort to shift the flow in two.

CHARLES W. HAWES DIES IN SAN JOSE

Word has been received here of the death Friday, February 27, at San Jose, of Charles W. Hawes, former owner of Fortune Branch auto garage, near Glendale. Mr. Hawes passed away as a result of heart trouble and chronic bronchitis after many months of suffering.
A report regarding his death and the funeral services was received as follows:
"Immediate funeral services were held Tuesday, March 3, at 2 p. m. from the San Jose Funeral parlors, for Charles W. Hawes. Rev. Frank Mark Riffenbach of Trinity Episcopal church, officiated and read "Abide With me" and "Crossing the Bar." The casket rested in the midst of a profusion of gorgeous flowers.
"Mr. Hawes was born in Santa Clara, September 9, 1863. His parents were old time settlers coming around the Horn in a sailing vessel from Boston, Mass. Mr. Hawes was a painter and decorator by trade but was forced to give up his work a few years ago on account of ill health. He passed away peacefully Friday, February 27 at midnight after months of suffering. He leaves a former wife, Sadie E. Hawes and three sons—Wadsworth S. Hawes of Los Angeles and Ayres and Andrew. Ayres of the U. S. navy now located at Panama, and also a widow, Ella B. Hawes, to whom he was married four years ago at Grants Pass and two sons, Thurston Brewster of San Jose.
"The officers and members of the degree of Poenchantia of which the widow is a member, attended the services at a home. Distresses were P. W. Decker, Mr. Scott, J. Gorman, E. Welch, Phil Miranda and H. Barclay. Interment took place in Mr. Hawes' mother's family plot in Oak Hill cemetery."

COWBOY-HEIRESS ROMANCE CRASHES

RENO, Nevada, March 13.—The romance of a New York society girl and a Colorado cowboy has led to Reno.
Barbara Monell Glaze, 26, was here today with the announced intention of obtaining a divorce from Kenneth Wilson Glaze, 30-year-old rodeo performer and harness maker, to whom she was married February 21, 1928.
The daughter and heiress of Ambrose Monell, former head of the International Nickel company who left a \$15,000,000 estate, did not reveal the basis of her suit.
Glaze was a stalwart 6-foot "bronco rider" cowboy who, after seven years on the range, had purchased a 1-room harness shop in Colorado Springs with proceeds of the sale of a band of horses.
Their romance was born of lustiness. Miss Monell, pretty horse woman and sports enthusiast, re-entering in Colorado Springs following an operation, straddled into Glaze's shop one day seeking a muzzle for a dog. Glaze welcomed her custom.
They were married five weeks later in Grace and St. Stephens Episcopal church there. There was no honeymoon. Soon they went to live on a ranch near South Park, Colo. Glaze's old "stomping ground."
There was no outward evidence of marital trouble.

POWER LINE REEL SHOWN TO ROTARY

The provinces of Artvin and Kars in the Georgian republic were known to be especially hard hit by the disease. There have been many deaths.

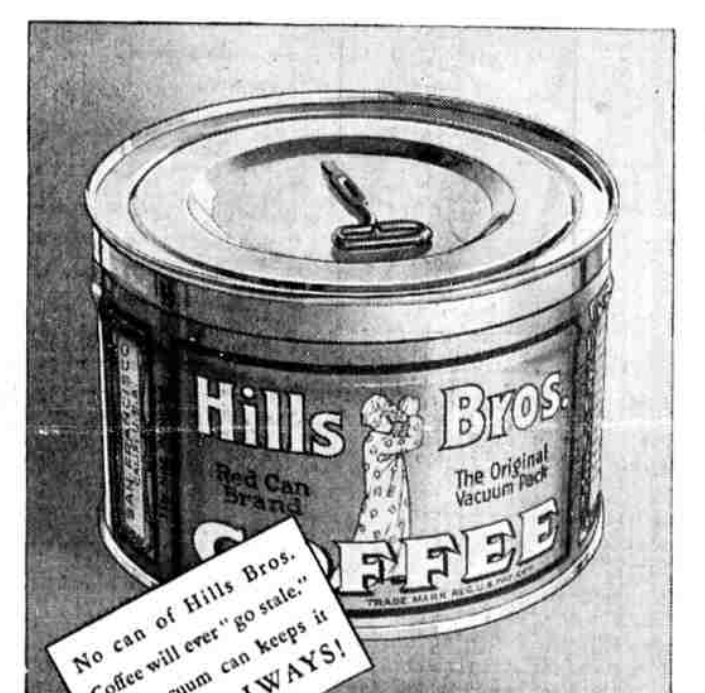
