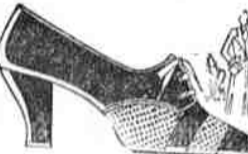

INDIAN QUINTET BEATS COOS RIVER

Game in Semi-Finals Ends 27-26; Marshfield to Be Opponent Tonight.

Roseburg went into the semi-finals in the district basketball championship tournament, being played at Marshfield this week, as a result of a 27 to 26 victory over Coos River in the first round last night. Myrtle Point won from Riverport, Coquille beat Port Orford and Marshfield won from North Bend in the opening series, leaving Roseburg, Myrtle Point, Coquille and Marshfield to play in the semi-finals tonight.

The Indians won the first round by a margin of one point, after Coos River had maintained a lead during the first three quarters of the game. The contest was very close, with Coos River more than four points difference in the score. Coos River was up 11 to 10 at the quarter and 19 to 18 at the half. In the third quarter Roseburg managed to tie the score 23 to 23 just before the period ended, and the Indians forged into the lead in the last period, with two field goals, while Coos River annexed one field goal and a free throw.

Entire scored 11 points for the Indians, while Johnson tossed the winning basket just before the whistle sounded.

Slow and Fast Game
The first game of the tournament, between Myrtle Point and Riverport, was slow and loose, Myrtle Point winning 22 to 11. Coquille and Port Orford played an exceedingly fast game which Coquille won 29 to 25. Port Orford staged a wonderful rally in the first of the second half and came within three points of tying the score in the third period. Marshfield and North Bend played a very close game, 27 to 26 in Marshfield's favor, in the last game of the evening.

Myrtle Point and Coquille play at 7:30 tonight in the semi-finals and Roseburg and Marshfield play the second game at 8:30 o'clock.
