Hats this year do not need a yardstick. They are all sizes as well as all shapes. Big, small, long, short, or broken up into points, they are all lined up waiting to see that we are to be beautifully framed this season. For our new hats are going to flatter, even glorify us, something that hasn't happened for many seasons. Then, too, we are going to wear hats that are definitely of a certain type. The sports hat will stay at home when we go to a formal luncheon or tea.

Brims will be much in evidence, with crowns cleverly manipulated to give character and a definite tendency to the modern. The majority of hats to be trimmed, for the right trimming can make a veritable triumph out of an otherwise undistinguished model. Some of the most attractive hats have their trimming tucked under the brim, always a charming accent to a pretty face. In the smart shops there will be hats that lead a double life. In the year 1919, a transport vessel returning from the war-torn coast of France landed at an American port on the Atlantic. Thousands of soldiers walked down the gang plank and with a smile of gladness touched good old American soil again. Then gentle hands moved from the hospital of the ship, the sick and injured ones who could not help themselves. A young wife looked into the pallid face of her husband. Strapped wounds and gas had kept him in hospitals in France for many months. He had not improved. There were no well equipped veterans' hospitals at this time. Specialists said the young husband could not recover, they gave him only a short time to live. Even though he could be moved only on a stretcher, this young wife took her invalid husband and their two-year-old son and crossed to the Pacific northwest. She nursed and cared for him with cheerfulness, love and tenderness until his death in 1925.

This is a picture of pathos, courage and tender service. It demonstrates how thousands of the members of the American Legion auxiliary served in our mission of mercy even before our auxiliary was fully organized.

Fortunately our government has taken into hand the care of disabled soldiers and are carrying on a well organized system of hospitals and soldiers' homes throughout the entire United States. Roseburg has made a determined fight to secure a branch of the national soldiers' home to be established in our ideal Unipqua valley climate and surroundings. Whatever the final outcome of this effort might be, we are glad that the American Legion auxiliary has been able to work in perfect unison with all other organizations in trying to secure for Roseburg this branch of the soldiers' home.
