Soldiers' Home Shorts

ROSEBURG LOOKS AS SITE, PORTLAND JOURNAL SAYS

PORTLAND, March 17—The Oregon Journal said today that Roseburg, which has been making a strong bid for the \$1,000,000 national soldiers' home to be built in Oregon, "looks as a probable site, judging from confirmatory telegrams" received here today.

The new soldiers' home unit must be in Oregon, south of Portland and west of the Cascades. This recommendation of the federal hospitalization board has been approved by President Hoover.

Hawley's Appeal Wins

"Vancouver was recommended by Major General George H. Wood, army representative who toured the northwest to inspect proposed sites," the Journal said, "it was believed Vancouver would be chosen until Congressman Hawley appeared to President Hoover in behalf of Roseburg."

"Hawley, according to Washington dispatches, brought political pressure to bear on the president in his effort to over-ride the recommendation of General Wood."

ROSEBURG HAS WON SITE, CONCLUSION OF HAWLEY

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 17.—Congressman Willis C. Hawley of Oregon today declared it is his "conclusion" that Roseburg will be given the one million dollar national soldiers' home to be built in Oregon.

Referring to the limitation placed by the federal board of hospitalization, approved by President Hoover, Hawley said "in this general area, the section to be considered is from Eugene to a point south of Roseburg. The board has directed its engineers to make the usual examinations and surveys therein."

"Roseburg has been endorsed as the site by Eugene and all localities south and by all localities generally north of Eugene, including Portland. Therefore, it is concluded this agreement will still continue, and this means the selection of Roseburg."

"My conclusion is Roseburg will receive the home."

"The board desires a site of 400 acres, and this Roseburg will provide. The site is exceptionally well situated, has unusually favorable climatic conditions, and fills all requirements as to a site for an institution of this kind."

Senator Charles L. McNary today telegraphed the Portland chamber of commerce the announcement that Oregon has been selected as the site of the new national soldiers' home, and said:

"Within two or three weeks an engineer from the veterans' bureau will be sent to survey the designated territory and recommend to the board a specific location which in his judgment constitutes the most acceptable site."

The hole has reached a depth of 9,700 feet and will be continued to 10,000 feet, company officials said. The temperature at the bottom of the well is said to be 210 degrees Fahrenheit. The weight of the pipe supported by the derrick is 210,000 pounds.

IRISH CELEBRATE ST. PATRICK'S DAY IN MANY LANDS

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, Mar. 17.—Residents of the Saorstat and kindred souls in the northern counties today celebrated Saint Patrick's day with nationwide religious ceremonies, civic programs, sporting contests, and feasts and dancing which may last until tomorrow morning.

An eleventh hour legislative omission prevented the shamrock in good Irish whiskey, but for those who did not live too far away there was a prospect of a trip over into Ulster where restrictions closing public houses on Saint Patrick's day do not hold.

A resolution which would have repealed the restrictions, now nearly a decade old, was on the calendar of the dail and should have been passed on late yesterday afternoon. In time for today's celebrations, but for some reason it was left off the list of the day's events and cannot come up until Wednesday.

Cosgrove Sends Greeting

President Cosgrove planned his second radio broadcast in three days to Irishmen residing in other nations, taking advantage at noon of an international hookup to cast a message of peace and good will to America and other countries.

In a published message of good will he said: "All is well with the Saorstat Eireann. We are continuing with increasing success to build the old Irish nation anew, to preserve and strengthen its distinctive nationality, and to secure for Ireland's sons and daughters a living in their own land and enjoyment of a freedom not less than that of any other nation."

He concluded with a greeting to American Irish, and the blessing, "God bless you all."
