LEEDY NAMED BY TURKEY GROWERS

County Agent Favored for Representative on the Regional Board.

J. C. Leedy, county agent, was nominated yesterday by the Oregon Turkey Growers, as representative from the Oregon district on the regional board of the Northwest Turkey association. Nominations are conducted for director in each of the eight districts of the Northwest organization, and the election is formally held by the common stockholders in the meeting at Salt Lake city to be held this year on April 10. Nomination is equivalent to election under this system.

Mr. Leedy will become a director of the Northwest association, representing the Oregon growers. He was unanimously chosen at the meeting of the growers held in Oakland. He will leave early in April for Salt Lake to attend the annual meeting there. The newly elected directors will decide the length of their terms by lot, as the board will be divided into terms of one, two and three years.

This is the first regular session of the association which was formed last year. A temporary board was elected to serve until the first annual meeting, which is to be held on the 10th. Herbert Beyers was elected as Oregon's representative, but has since been given a position as assistant manager, which is expected to become permanent at the annual meeting, making it advisable to nominate another director from this county.

In addition to the principal business of selecting a director, the growers at the Oakland meeting heard a report covering the season's activities, given by McKinley Huntington, manager of the Oregon Turkey Growers, and also considered routine business matters.

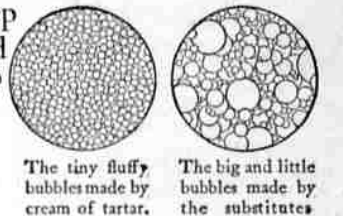

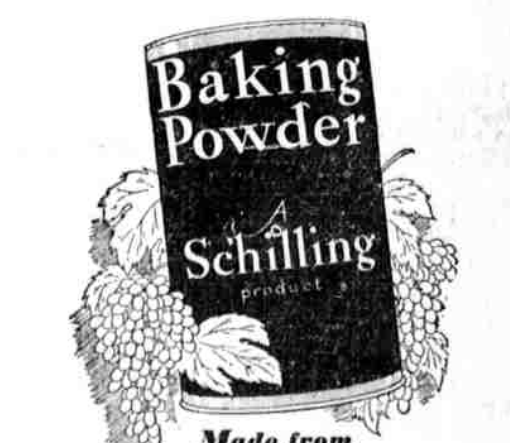
