Four teams, the outstanding aggregations of the state, are left in the running for the tournament championship at Salem, and a big time is expected by all of them today. Of course, two are due to be disappointed.

The Cowboys from Pendleton, boasting of a big veteran team with a liberal sprinkling of football men for left, tackle Portland's pride, Jefferson, in the first semi-final game. The Blue and Gold clad boys from the Rose City, won their second game last night, eliminating Baker, 31 to 21. It looks like an even game, with the odds slightly in favor of Jeff.

The other undefeated schools are Salem, the big favorite, and Benson, Portland's B team, which pulled the highest upset of the tourney by down Ashland high, an earlier choice to be one of the finalists. Have to give Salem an edge in this one, but Coach Hobson's Orange-men have shown that being the under dog means nothing to them.

The leading scorer thus far is Ashland's sparkling center, Howell, who has 28 counters. Last year he was selected as a member of the second all-state team, but seems to have first team choice clinched this year if his playing holds up. O'Neill, Baker forward, is next in the point race with 27, and McLean, Benson; Brown, Jefferson, and Makela, Astoria, are all tied for third with 19. Hill of Pendleton is likely to be up in the running before the run is over. All the leaders have played in two games, but Hill made 17 in his team's one encounter with Tillamook.

As was expected, Myrtle Point was not equal to holding Salem, but evidently put up a creditable battle, especially for the first half. The Coos county lads met Tillamook in their consolation game this morning, and again dropped the decision, the score being 28 to 16. This eliminates Myrtle Point from further competition, and probably eliminates the tournament system of deciding the representative in district 5.

Spencer's basketball team broke even in double header games at Cottage Grove last night, losing to the Cottage Grove Warriors 37 to 35 in an overtime period and beating the Eagles 37 to 30. The local team did not have the full squad, taking only eight players on the trip, as the team was recently broken up for the season, the Cot-

tage Grove games being accepted as post season matches. Fisher, Collins, Rapp, Hoffman, Koenig, Strickland, Whitney and Atterbury made up the local team, the eight players competing in both games.
