"You have won a victory after a gallant fight," continued Major Martin. "The generous thing is now for all other communities to continue to stand aside and let me believe they will."

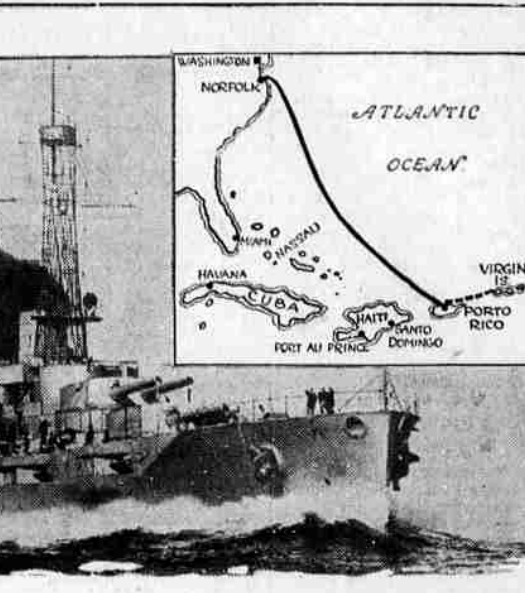
GLADIOLAS TO BE NAMED FOR VETS HOMEWORKERS

HOOPER INVITED TO TRY HIS ANGLING SKILL IN UMPQUA

President Herbert Hoover is to be given an invitation to visit the Umpqua river for a fishing trip during his western vacation this summer. The invitation, written by Attorney Carl Wimberly, is being conveyed to the president through Senator Charles L. McNary, whose wire in answer, received today, says: "I shall be glad to tell President Hoover, upon his return, of the famous Umpqua river and myriad fish that swim in its riffles. The president has not yet completed his itinerary for his western trip, and I shall place your cordial letter with his secretary and shall personally call his attention to the invitation of the president when he returns from his trip to the Caribbean sea."

PUBLIC ROADS BUREAU SENDS B. F. BEAZLEY

Engineer Will Commence Preliminary Job About April 1—Congress Asked for Funds.

The preliminary survey on the North Umpqua road will start about April 1, according to information received this morning by Vernon Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua national forest. B. F. Beazley, one of the best known engineers of the bureau of public roads has been assigned to the survey. It is reported, and will have crew of eight or ten men to assist him in the preliminary work.

Three-Week Cost Basis
The first camp, it is reported, will be established at the forest boundary, where the forest service camp facilities will be utilized by the crew. The forest service will cooperate with the crew in handling supplies and providing equipment.

Tractors to Be Used
Three tractors have been assigned to the Umpqua national forest area to be used for road maintenance work during the summer months, according to word received by Supervisor Harpham. One of the machines will be to the Diamond lake district, another to the Bohemia district and the third to the North Umpqua.

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
