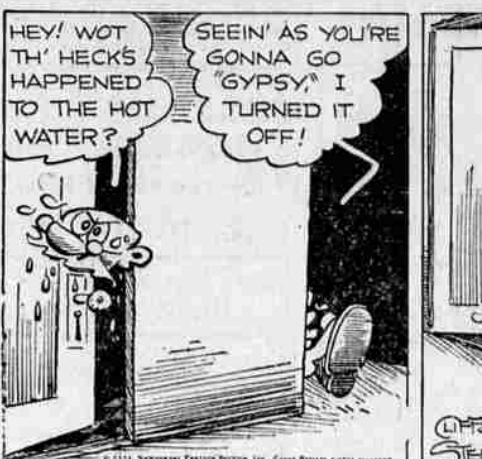

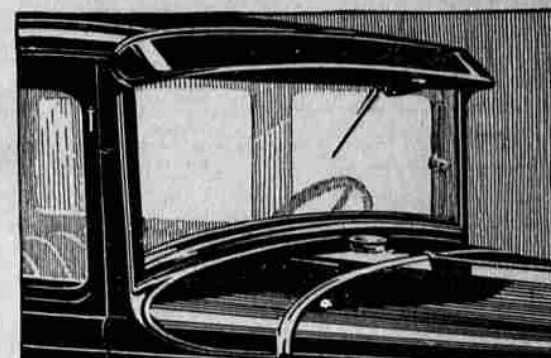
BRINGS DANCE BAND HERE

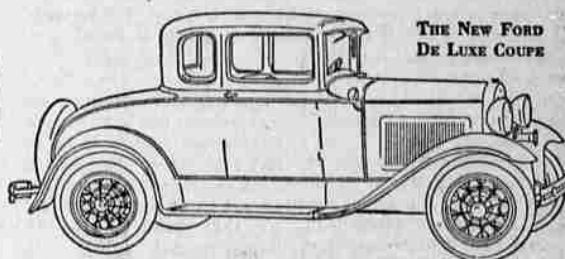
