Ten thousand hearts will do fox trot.

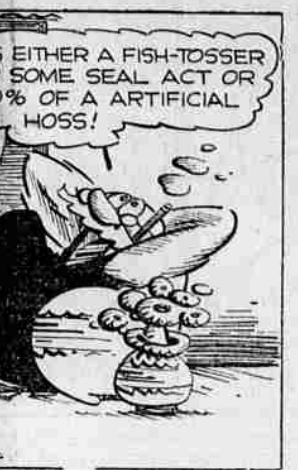
So we'll all make hay down in Roseburg way—

VANCOUVER IS PLACE TO "DIE," OPINION OF VET

Grief Over Selection Of Roseburg Registered in "Suicide" Stunt at Soup Session.

Members of the Chamber of Commerce at Vancouver, Washington, were disposing of their soup at the regular forum luncheon of that organization last Tuesday, when suddenly a pistol shot rang out on the mezzanine floor adjoining the dining room. The diners leaped from their seats and poured out of the hall to find a man slumped on the floor, a pistol gripped in one hand and in the other a white sheet of paper bore a hastily scribbled note, which read: "Forever, I am a soldier ready for a home. I had always looked forward to spending my last days in a soldier's home in Vancouver, but now I find that it is to be located in Roseburg. Rather than go there, I gladly choose death."

The "dead" man, however, apparently wasn't as "desperate" as the act indicated, for after the note was read he was assisted to his feet and proceeded to gulp soup as effectively as the rest of the members.

The "stunt" was staged in connection with the luncheon program, which honored E. S. Lindley, secretary of the Vancouver chamber, upon his return from a six weeks' trip to Washington, D. C., where he worked in an effort to secure the national home for his city.
