GRETA GARBO IN ALLURING ROLE

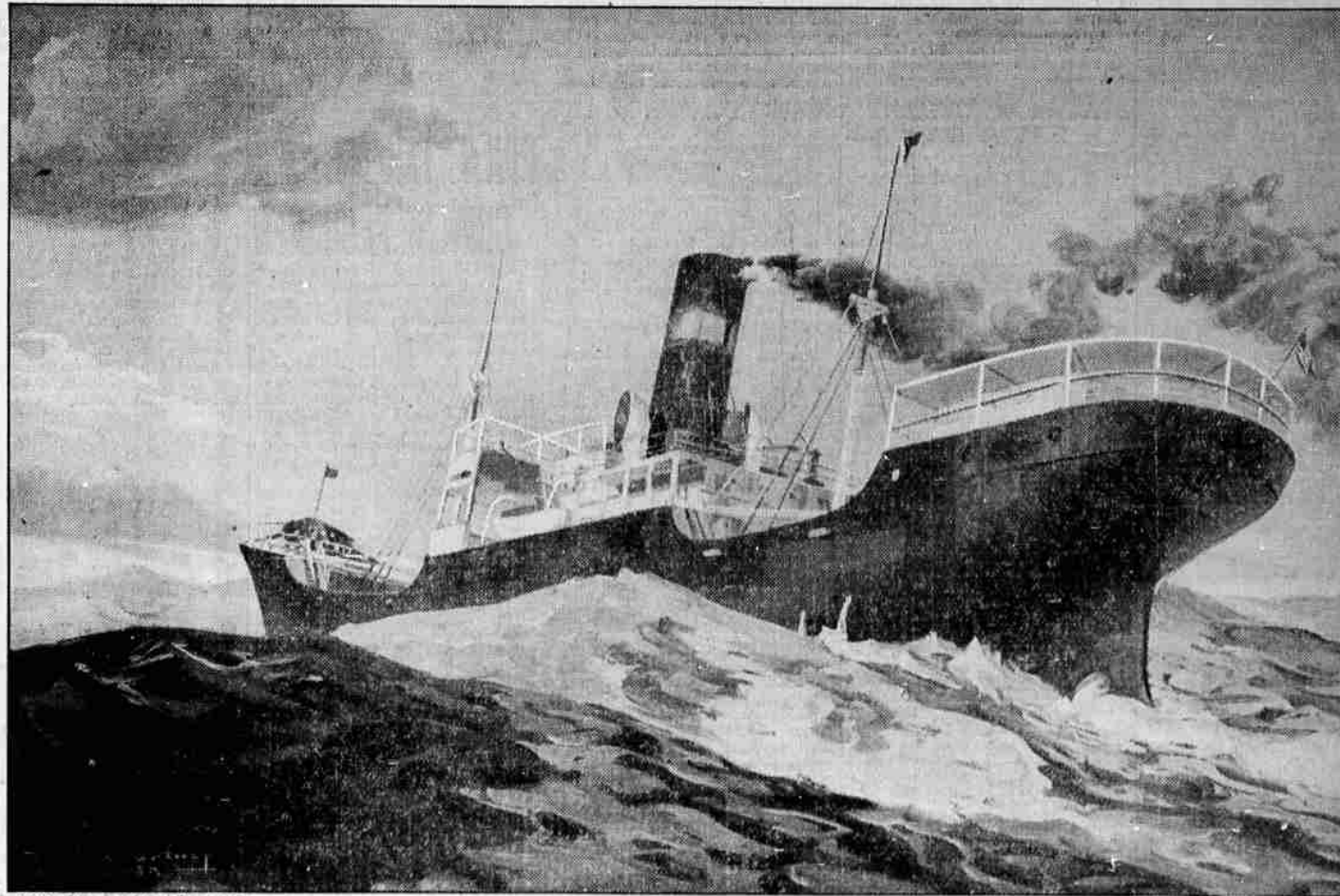
