

FISH AND GAME LEGISLATION IS REVIEWED FOR CLUB

DAYS CREEK, March 31—Hon. B. F. Nichols, state representative from Douglas county, gave an interesting talk before the South Umpqua Rod and Gun club at Tillamook, Wednesday evening, on the last legislature and its achievements, particularly along the line of fish and game legislation. Mr. Nichols, upon the request of the club, tonight for and secured a number of amendments to the new game code, one of the most vital being that clause relating to the carrying of firearms after sundown. Under the clause as originally drawn it was illegal to have in one's possession a firearm of any kind in any part of the state frequented by game animals, after sundown. This clause was obnoxious to the residents of the back-country whose business often calls for night traveling through wooded territory.

He also secured modification of the "stool pigeon" clause which, as first drawn, would have opened the way for unscrupulous enforcement officers to "frame" hunters. In his talk Mr. Nichols also discussed briefly the tax legislation considered and passed. On the matter of the Tillamook road he expressed a strong belief in the eventual selection of this road as a link in the state highway system and advised against the expenditure of county funds in new construction except on those sections that would undoubtedly be taken as a part of the highway.

Upon the suggestion of Archie Ferguson the proposition of staging a celebration on the 4th of July was discussed and the social committee of the club, of which V. N. Poole is chairman, was instructed to investigate the feasibility of the suggestion. It was proposed to hold the celebration on the projected new town site on the summit of the Rogue-Umpqua divide, and to invite the Jackson county boosters of the Tillamook trail to participate.

By vote of the club, and after considerable discussion, a committee consisting of C. C. Hill, B. F. Nichols and Clay Ulan was appointed to interview the state game commission at Roseburg, Friday evening and urge the completion of the steelhead egg-taking station at Steamboat creek. Oscar Shockley of Idylwild, who has had several years of experience in the trout hatchery business, spoke briefly on the project. He stated it to be his opinion that there was an ample supply of steelhead for the station and that it would be very worthwhile to complete the project.

The next meeting of the club is to be held at the Lavadore club building, Wednesday evening, April 8.

Lola Dysert acted as substitute teacher.

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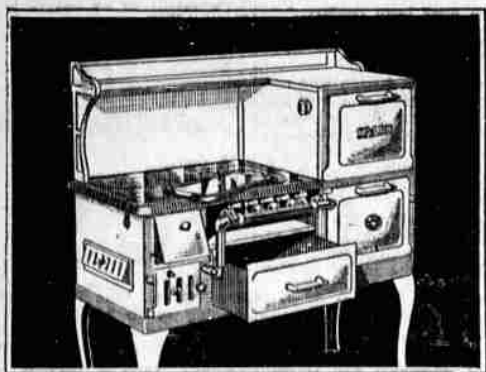
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
