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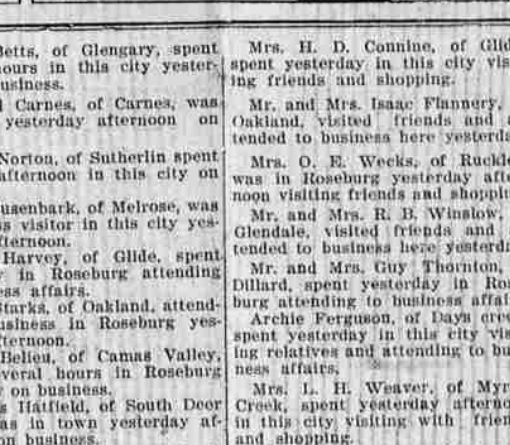

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., March 31—Mrs. Joseph Swindler was under guard in a hospital here today while authorities prepared to question her about the alleged murder of her husband, Chiloquin police chief.

Before he died nine hours after he was shot yesterday, Joseph Swindler told police his wife had shot him when he returned home early in the morning and that she then turned the gun on herself. Mrs. Swindler's condition was not serious, physicians said. "I love her as much as I ever did," Swindler told hospital attendants shortly before he died. "I

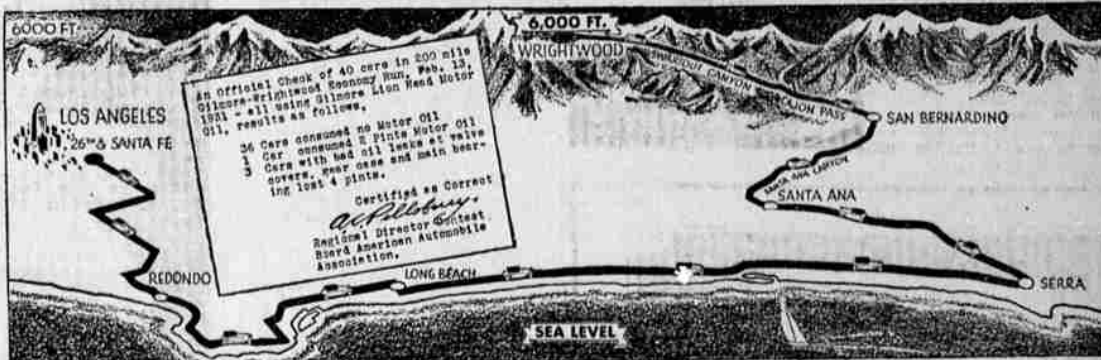
