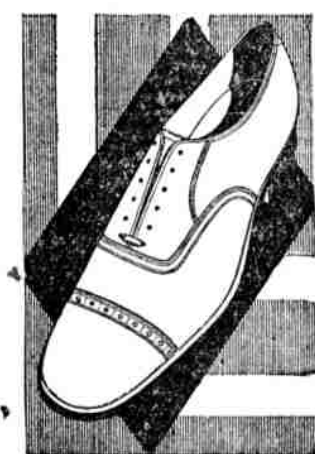

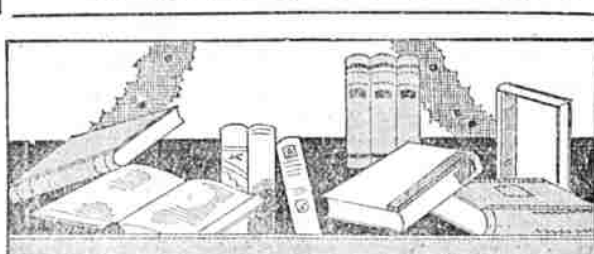

## MACLYN ARBUCKLE, NOTED ACTOR, DIES

WASHINGTON, N. Y., April 1.—Maclyn Arbuckle, actor, died last night at his home of an illness enduring since 1926. He was 61 years old.

He made famous the line "No body loves a fat man" when he played the role of Sheriff "Slim" Hoover in "The Roundup."

This role and that of "Jim Hatcher" in George Ade's "The County Chairman" were his best known. He was born in Texas, educated in Glasgow and studied law in Boston. Admitted to the bar at 21, he practiced only a year and turned to the stage.

Among his last stage roles were "Stings" in a revival of "The Steps to Conquer" and Benjamin Franklin in "Poor Richard."

Turning to motion pictures in 1922 he secured a success in "The Prodigious Judge." He played the title role.

He is survived by his widow, the former Miss Elizabeth Carlisle, whose family home is in Waddington, Tenn. They had no children.

## WRIGLEY PLANS BIG COTTON PURCHASE

Gum Maker to Acquire 100 Million Pounds to Put Money Into South.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)  
CHICAGO, April 1.—William Wrigley Jr. plans to purchase up to 100,000,000 pounds of cotton on the American market in the next eight months at prices not to exceed 12 cents a pound.

"All remittances from jobbers," Mr. Wrigley, the chewing gum manufacturer, announced today, will be credited to the Wrigley Cotton Investment fund and cotton will be purchased for delivery in December, 1931.

"Our object is to purchase up to 100,000,000 pounds of cotton, thus leaving our cash in the south." The project is similar to Mr. Wrigley's offer last year to aid grain producers by accepting wheat in payment of obligations to his Canadian corporation. From April 1 to December 1, provided cotton does not rise above 12 cents a pound, his company will accept cotton in payment for its products shipped to the south.

The purpose of the plan, Wrigley said, was threefold:

"1. We do not take cash out of the south, but on the contrary we leave our money in the south, in the south's own coin.

"2. We believe cotton at 12 cents per pound is a good investment and that we will make money by locking up some of the company's resources in cotton and holding it indefinitely, if necessary.

"3. We believe our plan will relieve, to the extent of our ability, a carrying strain on planters, southern business and banks at this critical time in the south's affairs.

"If cotton goes up, as we feel is possible, we will profit. But if it goes down we become partners with the south, and as such, take our loss with them. Our real object is to let the south pay us in kind—pay in cotton for what the south owes us. And, unless cotton goes up we propose to invest further of the company's resources in cotton until we actually own one hundred million pounds."

## GRANTS PASS CASE TO BE TRIED HERE

Roseburg has been selected for the trial of the case of the State of Oregon against Ray McQuitty, a damage action resulting from the condemnation of property for the Rogue river highway bridge, according to word received here. Judge Arlie G. Walker of McMinnville has been appointed to hear the case, which is to be tried May 25, starting at 9:30 a. m.

The case involves rights to a triangular piece of property which was a part of the Ray McQuitty auto camp at the north end of the new highway bridge at Grants Pass. The property was condemned following the filing of an injunction by the state highway department after efforts to reach a property value settlement had failed. Gus Newberry, Medford attorney, representing McQuitty, requested a change of venue, and it has been agreed to try the case at Roseburg.
