## ENTLER WINS AWARD AS BASKET SHOOTER

The award for accuracy in foot shooting in basketball for the past season has been given to Dan Entler, star of Roseburg's basketball squad during the year. Entler scored 659 converted free throws out of 1,090 attempts, an average of more than 60 out of every 100 tries.

Coach Turner at the beginning of the season impressed upon his players that a team converting one-half of its free throws would win the major portion of its games, a fact amply proven by the records for the season in this connection. Each player in the squad was required at practice each night to make 25 free throws and a record was kept, with the promise of a reward for the player making the highest percentage.

Entler scored 659, Worth West was second with 645, Clancy Taylor third with 598 and Arthur Durland fourth with 590. Durland had the highest record for any one night, shooting 24 out of 25 in one day. The award given was a beautiful statuette of a basketball player.

## SCHOOL ATHLETES BEGIN PENTATHLON

Senior and Junior Boys to Strive for Ratings on Groups of 5 Events.

The first annual pentathlon has been started by the Roseburg high schools, both the senior and junior school boys participating in similar events, although under different arrangements. A pentathlon is an athletic event in which each contestant is required to participate in five events. The contests being used this year are high jump, running broad jump, shot put, half-mile run and 100-yard dash.

Every boy in school is required to participate, unless prevented by some physical handicap, and is given an athletic rating upon the scores received. The score is based upon record marks for senior high school participants, and percentages are graded down in proportion. Standards are 5 feet 4 inches for high jump, 18 feet 8 inches for broad jump, 36 feet for shot put, 2 minutes and 8 seconds for half-mile run and 10 and 4-5 seconds for 100-yard dash. Junior high school standards are lower. Boys who can beat these marks can secure better than 100 per cent score. The high jump was attempted yesterday and resulted in some scores very near the standard mark.

When the events are completed the total scores will give the school's athletic rating. Boys who make unusually good showings, or who demonstrate exceptional ability in any event, will be given an opportunity to join the track squads for further training, if interested.

## ROOSEVELT SIGNS WET PROPOSAL BILL

(Associated Press Special Wire) ALBANY, N. Y., April 1 — Governor Roosevelt has signed the Cuyler bill asking congress to convene a constitutional convention for the sole purpose of repealing the eighteenth amendment despite the belief that the proposal was faulty in trying to limit a constitutional convention to a particular task.

He said last night his approval was given because he believed it expressed the will of the legislature and because he felt that the legislative action reflects the preponderant sentiment of the state. He added he believed this sentiment was based on "two righteous and sane objectives. First, to eliminate the fundamental source of the greater part of modern, organized crime, and, secondly, to promote a greater temperance." He added: "To this policy, as I have repeatedly stated, I subscribe."

The two scouts from Drain deserved special credit because of their coming into a group of strangers to qualify in their tests. Charles Roberts of troop 6 returned again this month and completed his requirements for the rank of first class scout.

Donald Wimberly qualified for first aid merit badge, Harry Hildebrand for personal health. Allen Solberg for citizenship. Clark Leedy in animal industry and Gilbert Finlay in his discourse on astronomy proved beyond all doubt that he was worthy of a merit badge on that subject. This is a very difficult merit badge to win and required a great amount of study and observation.

All adults who were present at the court of honor counted one hundred points each for the troop which had invited them. ## R. H. S. BOXERS AND WRESTLERS TO VIE FRIDAY

Boxing and wrestling fans will have an opportunity to see several first matches Friday night at the Roseburg senior high school when survivors of previous elimination matches conducted in the wrestling and boxing classes at the school meet in the first annual amateur boxing and wrestling tournament.

The boys will be fighting for school championships in their respective weight divisions and there will be no "stalling" in any event, for the rules require that there must be a decision in every event. In the event of a tie at the end of the given period in any bout, the contestants will have an extra one-minute period in which the decision must be reached. Decisions will be made by a referee and two judges.

Boxers will fight three 2-minute rounds, in accordance with amateur rules. The wrestling bouts will have a time limit of seven minutes.

Interest Runs High  
Due to the demand for boxing and wrestling instruction, classes in both sports were organized several weeks ago. The boxing class has been instructed by Peter Jensen, principal of the high school, and the wrestling classes have been conducted by E. A. Britton. The boys have shown much interest and very good progress in the different sports.

The contestants are very eager for the bouts to be held Friday night, and all of the boys are determined to give their best. Fans may be assured, Jensen states, that there will be no stalling, as is so often seen in professional matches, and that every fighter and wrestler will throw his entire ability in to the encounters.

Ladies are particularly invited by those in charge of the tournament to attend the bout, as every assurance is given that nothing of an offensive nature will be permitted in the event.

While knowledge will be permitted if they can be obtained in a 3-round match, the officials will be instructed to see that fights are stopped if any boy is incapable of defending himself, so that no permanent injuries can result. Judges will be instructed to give credit for aggressiveness in the various matches.

The bouts will start promptly at 7:30 o'clock.

## WALLA WALLA HARD HIT BY TORRENT

(Associated Press Special Wire) WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 1. — Officials hastily estimated this morning that flood damage in Walla Walla and the surrounding country might reach \$750,000 to \$1,000,000. A partial check disclosed, they said, that the flood of yesterday and today was the worst in the history of the city.

Losses in the city alone run into hundreds of thousands of dollars, they said, but no accurate check could be made until the water recedes.

More than 18 inches of water was rushing through business streets this morning. Virtually every store basement and many homes were flooded.

Campus Is Flooded  
Mill creek, which curls through the city, reached the crest at 3 o'clock this morning and began to recede. It had overflowed concrete dykes and bulkheads and resisted all efforts to curb it. The Whitman college campus was flooded and students splashed about historic grounds.

The big duplex press of the Walla Walla Bulletin was under water, with damage of several thousand dollars. Debris, silt and slime filled the streets. Two garages were washed into the swollen stream and carried away last night. No lives were reported lost since yesterday. Clerks and business men were marooned in stores and offices. Traffic was blocked, except that some heavy trucks, too weighty to be washed away, were used to force against the current.

SALEM, April 1 — James E. Kingsley, convicted murderer of Sam Prescott, Ashland police officer, today was returned to the Jackson County Jail at Medford. Kingsley has been confined to the state penitentiary awaiting execution on April 3. Last Friday the supreme court granted the motion for an appeal which automatically gives the defendant a stay of execution. Under the law the prisoner must be returned to the county where he was sentenced pending further action of the court.

PORTLAND, March 26 — Critically wounded by discharge of a large revolver with which a group of boys were playing, Billy Pine, 12 years old, was rushed to a hospital here today. A bullet struck him in the abdomen.
