STUDENTS' ESSAY
CONTEST LAUNCHED

Money Prizes Offered For
Best Articles on War
on Tuberculosis.

Eight Douglas county high schools have entered a state-wide essay contest, which is being conducted by the Oregon Tuberculosis association, Mrs. Runyan, president of the Douglas County Health association, announced today.

This contest is an additional feature of the early diagnosis campaign which is being sponsored by the local health association, and is open to all secondary and public high schools. The essays are to be between 500 and 750 words in length.

Prizes for the winning essays in the state are: First prize \$75; second, \$50; third, \$40; fourth, \$30; fifth, \$20; sixth, \$10. The Oregon Mutual Life Insurance company is contributing the state prizes. As an additional incentive to Douglas county students to enter the contest, the Lions club, Rotary club, Kiwanis club and the Business and Professional Women's club of Roseburg have each contributed \$5.00. Through this arrangement, the boy and the girl in the southern part of the county including Roseburg, and the boy and the girl in the northern part of the county entering the best essays will each receive a five dollar prize.

The contest will end May 1, and the prizes awarded not later than June 1. "It is hoped through this contest to focus attention of high school students on the importance of tuberculosis control in the 'teen age,'" said Mrs. Runyan. "When we consider that 20 per cent of all

patients at the Oregon state tuberculosis hospitals are under 20 years of age, that 73 students (grade, high and college) and 12 teachers were patients at these hospitals during the past two years, that of all the Oregonians who die each year from tuberculosis 15 per cent are under 20 years of age, and of all the deaths among girls, 15 to 19 years old, 28.5 per cent are caused by tuberculosis, we realize more keenly the extreme gravity of the situation. Wisely—in view of these facts—there is concentration upon the 'teen age.'"
