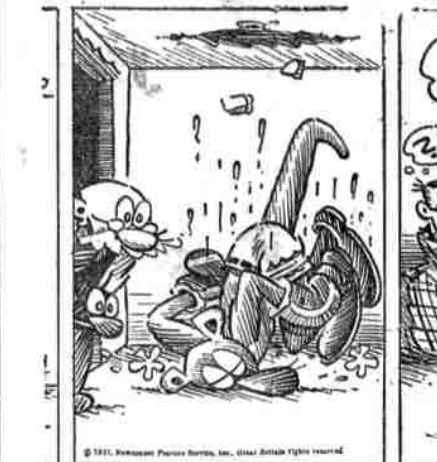

C., April 7 — With three of his countrymen in jail accused of slaying Nankichi Watanabe, a Japanese, police today strove to learn whether the killing was related to the mysterious deaths of 20 other members of the Japanese colony as the work of a murder syndicate.

THEATRE PICKETS WIN COURT RULING

(Associated Press Local Wire) SALEM, April 7 — The Oregon supreme court today denied a temporary injunction against picketing Portland theaters pending an appeal from Multnomah county for a permanent injunction against the trade union.

The case is a joint one brought by the Venetian theatre, Granada theatre, the Moreland theatre and the Dunn company, of Portland, against the Portland Moving Picture Machine Operators Protective union. The original complaint charges the union with instituting picketing campaigns against them, and of maintaining these campaigns for months. The theatres request a permanent injunction, stating the strike period had run its course long enough, and that pickets are doing irreparable damage to their business. The Dunn company since has dropped from the case because of change in ownership, and motion to withdraw was granted.

MURDERS INCITE HOLY LAND

HAIFA, Palestine, April 7 — A number of Arabs in villages near Yagour, not far from here, have been arrested by officers investigating the slaying of three Jews and wounding four more Sunday night. Ten thousand Jews followed the coffins of those killed to the cemetery. All Palestine has been shaken by the slaying. The three Jews

were returning peacefully to their homes when attacked. Jewish colonists are again feeling insecure.
