### C. C. JULIAN FACES BRACE OF CHARGES

LAREDO, Tex., April 8.—C. C. Julian, Oklahoma and California oil operator, was named in four of five indictments returned by the Webb county grand jury here in connection with the alleged attempted robbery of \$50,000 from L. S. Boring of Oklahoma City and San Antonio.

C. C. Boren, the oil man's secretary, was named in three counts, and Clay Mann, an employee of Julian in the Julian Oil and Royalty Co., of Oklahoma City, was named in four counts.

One blanket indictment was returned jointly against C. C. Julian, C. C. Boren and Clay Mann, charging extortion and robbery. The offense was committed, the bill alleged, on April 2 against Lamar S. Boring.

Two counts in the bill alleged that "the defendants did forcibly take Lamar S. Boring for the purpose and with the intent of taking, receiving, demanding, and extorting \$50,000 moneys."

### IDAHO POPULATION 98 PER CENT WHITE

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Idaho's population was shown to be 98 per cent white with 71 per cent of the residents of native parentage in an analysis made today by the census bureau.

The population comprised 437,562 white persons, 668 negroes, 1,278 Mexicans, 3,335 Indians, 35 Chinese, 1,121 Japanese, 98 Filipinos, 21 Koreans, 7 Hindus, and 5 Hawaiians.

### NEW SUIT MORE TO INDIAN THAN TRIAL

SPOKANE, Wash., April 8.—More concerned over a new suit of clothes than the government's impending attempt to take his life, Joseph Seymour, Kallispell reservation Indian,aved trial for the murder of his brother here today.

A federal grand jury indictment returned last November 17 accused him of shooting his brother, Louis, with a rifle after an argument on the reservation on Nov. 1.

The brother died the next day. Seymour picked out the suit himself, adding a white shirt and brilliant tie to his purchases as his attorney and a deputy United States marshal stood by.

The trial was called before Federal Judge J. Stanley Webster for this morning.

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### OREGON CITY JURY FREES EGG HURLER

OREGON CITY, April 8.—While the records appear to be clear on the point that an egg was thrown, and that the egg was over-ripe, it didn't take a police court jury long to determine that the man accused of hurling it was innocent.

So on the first ballot the jury last night acquitted Mark Sullivan, former fire captain, of the charge of spattering the egg on the city's most handsome fire truck as the vehicle streaked down the main street recently, with siren open, announcing the spring opening celebration.

Maurice Milstead, volunteer driver, over whose head the egg showered, signed the complaint against Sullivan, he said, but testified he did so upon the suggestion of Fire Chief Surfur and City Manager Franzen.

Keen interest in the affair was based not so much on the actual throwing of the odorous egg, but on a slumbering feud between former firemen and active members of the department. Sullivan was one of the men ousted when Surfur went in as chief a year ago.
