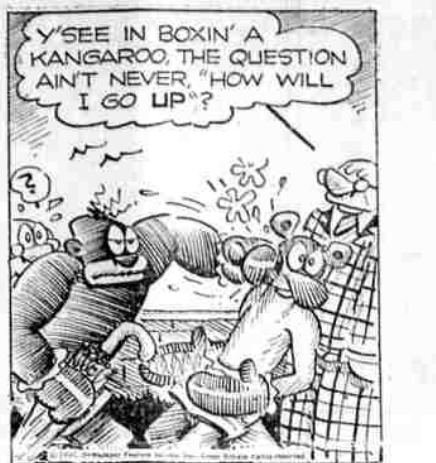

OREGON CITY BANK CLOSES ITS DOORS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) OREGON CITY, Ore., April 10.—The Bank of Commerce here failed to open its doors this morning. Notices on the doors informed depositors that the bank was in the hands of A. A. Schramm, state bank superintendent.

The notice, signed by the directors, said: "During the past few days, due to damaging rumors, a heavy cash withdrawal has been made, threatening our cash position. We believe the savings depositors are protected. We are taking this action so that no depositor may be benefited at the disadvantage of another."

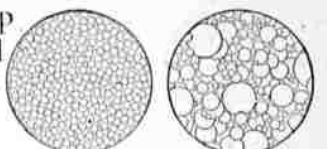
Another notice said Schramm had taken possession of the bank and that the doors would be closed for a few days to post all books.

The bank was chartered in 1887, and its last statement showed deposits to the extent of \$952,000, and resources of \$1,234,000. John R. Humphreys is president, O. G. Jones, vice-president and cashier, Guy Mount, vice-president. Other directors include E. P. Dedman, H. C. Belton, E. A. Chapman, J. W. Ganong, George H. Gregory and George Sullivan.
