Nicholas Longworth Passes

Speaker Nicholas Longworth, taken suddenly yesterday by an attack of pneumonia, has been a figure in national politics since the early days of the first Roosevelt administration. Known at the age of 33 as the "boy representative" from Ohio, his native state, he has served as a Congressman for more than twenty years.

Mr. Longworth's most outstanding characteristic in his political life was his consistent regularity. He has always bitterly opposed "radical wings," "bolters," and other types of disruptive party factions. Always a staunch republican, Mr. Longworth even opposed his father-in-law, Theodore Roosevelt, when Roosevelt in 1912 divided the national republican vote with William Howard Taft, resulting in the election of Woodrow Wilson. In that election year and as a result of the division in republican ranks, Mr. Longworth suffered the only defeat of his career, losing his seat in the House of Representatives by a bare hundred votes. He was returned to Congress two years later, in 1914, and has been a member of the House continuously until his death.

Possessed of many political enemies Mr. Longworth had few if any personal enemies. He was highly respected by all and his death removes a staunch and fighting member of the republican party. Few men have attained or ever will attain the distinction and high regard enjoyed by Mr. Longworth. His death is a loss to our country.

Talks on Health

CHILDREN are the victims of common ailments, many of which are preventable. The contagious diseases of childhood are transmitted from one child to another. This can be avoided by proper care and much unnecessary suffering prevented.

Simple hygienic rules taught during childhood greatly influence the health of the individual. It is believed by most authorities that the ideal place for this instruction is in the school.

I believe this an excellent plan, but such teaching should not end there. It should be practiced, emphasized and repeated at home.

Home teaching is sometimes more convincing than the instruction received at school. Where the home environment is not as ideal as it should be, the instruction at school is a vital necessity.

Children should be taught at an early age the value and use of the handkerchief. They should be instructed how to protect the nose and mouth when coughing or sneezing and given the reasons why.

They should be warned against the common habit of placing fingers and pencils in the mouth. Every child should be carefully instructed in the necessity of washing the hands with soap and water frequently during the day. This habit should be acquired as soon as possible. Everybody, young and old, should remember the necessity of having clean hands before eating.

Brushing the teeth upon arising and at retiring, should be made a part of the daily routine of every child. This responsibility should be begun at an early age as possible.

To insure health among our young, it is advisable that they be examined periodically. Strict attention must be given to posture, ear, eye, nose, throat, dental and other possible defects should be discovered as soon as possible. When these are corrected in early life, much undue and unnecessary suffering is escaped in later life.

These are mere hints, but I do want you to know that the welfare of the child and the state of adult health are founded on the health practices of youth.

Answers to Health Queries
H. D. M. Q.—How can the habit of biting the nails be overcome?
A.—Painting the nails with liniment of asafetida—this has a most unpleasant taste and should be helpful in correcting the habit. In some cases the trouble is due to nervousness. Under these circumstances the nerves should have attention.

J. Y. Q.—I am a girl of 18 and troubled with puffiness beneath the eyes upon awakening in the morning. I am in perfect health otherwise and not troubled with constipation or sleeplessness. What would be apt to cause trouble of this nature and how can it be corrected?

A.—Be sure that the kidneys are functioning as they should. A careful analysis may be helpful in locating the cause and then definite action and treatment can be outlined.

CHAPTER 46

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Comrade Stewart reported on his European trip at the meeting on October 1, 1929.

On October 15, 1929, at the post meeting and the executive meeting he special Armistice Day committee was selected with Vincent F'Brien as general chairman. In the discussion on Armistice Day plans it was brought out that more Legionnaires should march in the parade on Armistice Day, John E. Barry reporting on plans for the patriotic service announced that Jon. O. P. Coshov would deliver an address at the eleven o'clock service. This service was held at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of the eleventh year after the World War ended. This was the second time Judge Coshov was chosen to deliver the lecture on our Armistice Day program.

At the regular meeting on November 12, 1929, committees on the Armistice Day activities reported, and these reports indicated that in every way the celebration was successful. The weather was ideal, the crowds were large, everybody had a real time, and financially the post came out well. After so many successful celebrations of this, our holiday, we never expect anything but a successful carrying out of all our plans on Armistice Day.

At the meeting on November 12, 1929, the post decided to make a survey of all the cemeteries in this vicinity and to make up a roster of all the deceased veterans who have been laid to rest in our cemeteries. The value of such a roster has been demonstrated on several occasions when efforts have been made to locate the last resting places of some veterans of earlier wars who were known to have died in our county. We have marked the graves of our buddies with Legion markers, but unless a proper list is kept we will soon not know just whose remains were laid beneath the marker. It is to be hoped that the committee appointed for this task will work zealously until the list is completed.

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
