SUMMER SCHOOL "ADS" REJECTED

Control Board Hits Plans of Oregon University and State College.

SALEM, April 13.—Summer school advertising for the University of Oregon and Oregon State college, in teachers journals and trade journals of national circulation, was rejected by the state board of control today when requisitions and confirmation orders were presented. A half dozen items calling for page and quarter page advertisements in these publications met with disapproval of Governor Julius L. Meier. The other two members of the board concurred.

Some of this advertising had already been ordered, and when asked what disposition should be made of these, coming from the Oregon State college, the governor said "I vote no; they perhaps will charge it to some other fund." The governor was emphatic in his rejection of these items, the total of which approximated \$250.

While the board by its regular session approved numerous items from the state institutions of higher learning, several of the larger ones were held over for approval of the state board of higher education, which meets here next Monday. Among the items approved was one for 500 reprints of "the detection of horse meat as an adulterate in sausage." The board also refused to purchase films for a stunt play at the Oregon State college.

Two members of the board, Governor Meier and Hal E. Ross, secretary of state, voted against the trimmings for Sam Brown belts for penitentiary guards. The governor declared the guards looked good enough now, and did not need the extra equipment. Treasurer Tom Kay voted for the item. Ross declared the Sam Brown belts should be kept only for state police officers. The governor also protested sending for samples of the latest style shirts for prisoners upon discharge from the penitentiary.

ROSES REQUIRE RIGHT SOIL AND CONSTANT CARE

Roses will repay you with an abundance of lovely blooms if you give them the right start and then keep them free from insects and disease.

Excavating the beds to a depth of three feet is not too much for roses need a deeply prepared and well fertilized soil that is properly drained. Hybrid perpetuals and heavy-growing climbers are at their best in rather heavy soil, whereas hybrid teas like lighter and warmer soil.

Green aphid or plant lice is an insect that can be easily overcome by spraying with a soap solution or weak nicotine solution. The rose caterpillar or leaf roller can be destroyed by crushing them between the thumb and finger. To be sure, this is not a pleasant pastime, but it is the only remedy. Watch for them when the flower buds are forming, and begin to show signs of plumpness.

The worst fungus diseases of our garden roses are black-spot and mildew. If the plants are regularly dusted with a mixture of nine parts of dusting sulphur to one part of powdered lead arsenate, these two diseases can be prevented to some extent. Repeat the dusting every two weeks in the summer. It will be an excellent protection.

Mildew is generally the result of great and sudden atmospheric changes, and of long-continued spells of damp and cloudy weather. Sulphur and soot are the best remedies. One or the other should be applied the moment the disease is noticed. Sprinkle the plants with water before the dust is applied, or it should be put on early in the morning while the dew is still on. Prevention is, of course, far better than cure, and plants that have a free circulation of air about them are seldom attacked by mildew. Keep the climbers away from the house.

Do not let the possibilities of insect enemies or diseases curb your enthusiasm for growing roses. They are truly the Queen of Flowers and are considered by many to yield more in beautiful flowers and personal satisfaction than any other flower that grows.

TRAFFIC CHECKING STATIONS NAMED

Checking in stations, where state traffic officers report while making their regular patrols, have been created by the state motor vehicle department as an aid to motorists.

Traffic officers may be located quickly through any of these stations, which have information on the officers' schedules, and can make telephone connections to secure his services without loss of time. Traffic officers are also being equipped with emergency first aid kits for use in event of accidents and whenever an officer is needed in time of emergency, he may be quickly secured through one of the stations appointed by the state for this purpose. An interesting booklet containing a list of stations, registration offices and information on accident prevention, together with the names of traffic officers, has been compiled by Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, and Kent Shoemaker, chief state traffic officer, and are being distributed, free of charge, to motorists for handy reference. Reporting stations in Douglas county are Highway cafe, Drain; Oakley's garage, Oakland; sheriff's office, Roseburg; King's service station, Coos Junction.
