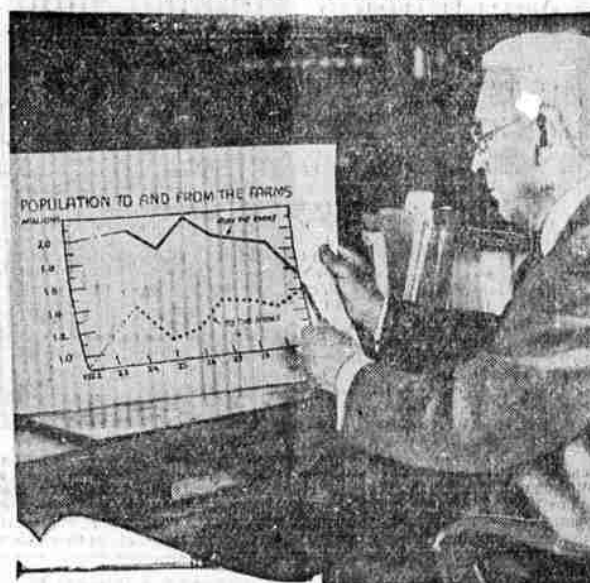

### DOUSTER OF WARDENS NOT TO BE SPEEDED

Change in Officers to Be Gradual, Commissioner Vining Explains.

PORTLAND, April 15.—Although the resignations of all employees of the state game commission have been demanded, Art M. Fish, chief of law enforcement of the commission, said today all wardens will be expected to continue their work as if no such order had been issued.

The trout fishing season opened today and the regular complement of enforcement officers was expected to be in the field to the end that anglers have more than their consciences to guide them.

While the resignations of 145 employees of the game commission are to be in the hands of the new commission within 12 days, the officers thus resigned will not become vacant until the commission takes formal action in each case.

This was the interpretation placed on the order by J. E. Vining, of Ashland, at a meeting of the newly organized commission here yesterday.

"These officers," Vining declared, "will not be vacated until we declare them so." Marshal Dana, chairman of the commission, indicated positions will not be vacated nor new appointments made for several weeks. He will be out of the state three weeks, he said, so will be unable to meet with the commission during that period.

The commission decided to meet here on Monday, May 11. Until they are formally relieved by the board, all employees will continue their duties as in the past.

### OREGON INVESTS IN NEEDED BUILDINGS

SALEM, April 15 — Contract for construction of the \$40,000 cottage for the feeble minded institution here, completing the quadrangle of buildings of the institution, will be let in two weeks, it was announced today by Carl Abrams, secretary of the state board of control. Bids for construction were advertised today.

The new cottage will house 110 boys, Abrams said, and work will be rushed as soon as the contract is let. The entire investment will amount to about \$50,000, including furnishings.

The board has just completed the deal by which the state printing office was purchased, as authorized by the state legislature. The deal was consummated at a cost of \$86,000. The building is located just off the state capitol grounds.

The members of the board viewed the site for the large hospital building for the state tuberculosis clinic, which will be constructed as soon as plans are completed. The building will be located in the center of the group of cottages and to the rear of the main hospital building. The building, to be constructed at a cost of about \$75,000, will accommodate 80 patients, and will be provided with the main hospital features and laboratories for use by the entire institution.
