Factions Split Ohio Democrats

Ohio, traditionally a pivotal state in the outcome of the presidential race, promises to more than uphold that tradition next year. In fact, a political forecast would be nearer right in summing up the 1936 political situation, if he said, "As Ohio goes, so goes the nation," to paraphrase an old adage usually applied to Maine. Whether Ohio will ride on the Roosevelt band wagon, or whether Republicans have a chance to capture the state rests largely on the outcome of the race for Democratic nomination as governor, a contest which seems to lie between Martin L. Davey, present incumbent, and Charles Sawyer, former lieutenant governor. Davey, at the start of his turbulent administration, clashed violently with the New Deal over relief administration, creating a sharp political rift. He is also at odds with Ohio's senior senator, Robert J. Bulkley. Even though this internal discord is prevented from breaking into open warfare, the situation will hardly contribute to the harmony of Ohio Democrats who need a united front to carry the pivotal Buckeye state.
