PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 17.—(AP)—A flag-pole in every fair-sized city in Oregon is the aim of the works progress administration, State Administrator E. J. Griffith said. Sixteen are now underway in eastern Oregon. Cost of each is estimated at \$26.83, of which municipalities pay \$10. Thirteen workers are employed for each pole and flag.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Voters of Portland had before them today the proposal to issue bonds for the purchase of a site for a new airport. The ballot title was completed yesterday. The vote, on an amount "not to exceed \$300,000," will be taken Jan.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 17.—(AP)—The majority of the nation's Episcopal bishops have endorsed the appointment of Dean Benjamin D. Dagwell of Denver as bishop of Oregon. Archbishop H. D. PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 17.—(AP)—The United States needs a stronger neutrality law if it is to escape European conflict, Senator Gerald P. Nye of North Dakota said in an interview here. In commenting on naval parity, he said: "Who are we to say that Japan or any other nation cannot be on a parity with us?"

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Municipal Judge Donald E. Long fined Martin Johnson, laborer, \$50 on a disorderly conduct charge for passing a half-pint of liquor to a woman jail prisoner here.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Fifteen biting dogs were quarantined last month to determine whether they had rabies, and several did, the city nuisance bureau said today.

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Charged police officers increased their efforts today to check a "petty crime" wave here which started a week ago with theft of the police chief's radio, fishing tackle and other equipment. Several cars were looted of tools, gasoline and blankets. Thieves ransacked three business houses and a residence over the week-end.

SALEM, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The much-discussed question as to whether Salem shall operate under a city managership plan of government will be definitely decided at the January 31 special election. The city council voted 9 to 4 to submit the plan to the voters.

SALEM, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The scheduled protest by the state board of control against the proposed city ordinance changing the zone near the state capitol grounds from residential to business, was dropped when it was pointed out that the ordinance would not permit establishment of business houses directly surrounding the capitol building.

It was explained that the change was only for the purpose of removing legal obstacles in the way of constructing a new statehouse and a federal building.

SALEM, Dec. 17.—(AP) Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon revoked the parole of E. Rigney, Salem, who was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary last July for burglary. McMahon held that Rigney had violated provisions of his parole providing he should abstain from the use of intoxicating liquor.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Word was received here today that the Rev. Lester E. Bond, former pastor of the Riverside Community church here and ex-chaplain of the department of Oregon, American Legion, was rallying at Chula Vista, Cal., from an attack of typhoid pneumonia. He had been critically ill.

OREGON CITY, Ore., Dec. 17.—(AP)—The Clackamas county court signed the contract with Glen L. Hord for construction of the new \$194,700 courthouse, but postponed signing the contract for wrecking the old building until the PWA gives final approval to the construction contract.
