12-STORY PLUNGE ENDS LIQUOR ORGY

Investigation Trails Death of Olga Steck, Former N. Y. Show Girl.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 18.—(AP)—An auburn-haired woman, tentatively identified by Deputy Coroner Mike Brown as Olga Steck, 33, former Broadway show girl, was killed in a 12-story plunge from a hotel today.

Brown immediately began an investigation to determine whether she was pushed from the window or had committed suicide after a drinking party.

Brown said Ernest Saxe, a liquor salesman, declared the woman was his wife and voluntarily offered to give the deputy any information he could.

Records at the harbor emergency hospital, Brown stated, showed Saxe had appeared there last night for treatment of scalp lacerations. The officer declared Saxe stated, while undergoing treatment, that Miss Steck had beaten him over the head with a slipper after a quarrel. A taxicab driver brought him to the hospital for treatment.

Police were asked to apprehend a man who registered at the hotel from Los Angeles a month ago, and a middle-aged couple who left the party some time before the fatal plunge.

There was no evidence of a struggle in the hotel room but a whiskey bottle and glasses were on a table. Two suitcases were on the bed as though they were being packed.

In her purse were letters and an I. O. U. for \$150 made out to the proprietor of a Market street club.

Saxe declared a divorce action was dropped last December. He told Deputy Brown Miss Steck was married to another man about 17 years ago. The other man, Saxe said, is the father of two sons, 18 and 19 years old.
