SALEM, Dec. 20.—(AP)—E. Franz of Portland was named chairman of the Oregon State bakery board today as the new members met in the initial session in the governor's office. R. F. Renard was elected vice-chairman and Walter Young of Oregon City treasurer.

Offices of the board, whose functions will be similar to those under the former agricultural adjustment act, will be in Portland, with E. M. Sattel as executive secretary.

While the new board's chief functions will be regulatory for the industry, Franz stated it would endeavor to lift that business to higher standards both as to system and sanitation. Size of loaves will be regulated and prices as filed by the bakeries with the board must be adhered to, he said.

U. OF O. PREXY TO BE INSTALLED FEB. 6

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 20.—(AP)—Dr. Clarence Valentine Boyer will be formally inaugurated as president of the University of Oregon February 6.

The committee on arrangements announced the inauguration would climax an all-day session of representatives of other colleges and universities, faculty and students of the universities, and citizens of Oregon.

Dr. Boyer became the university's sixth president when he took up the actual work April 16, 1934 after serving as acting president since January 15, 1934. Dr. Arnold B. Hall was president of Oregon

before Dr. Boyer. President Boyer came to the university in 1926 as head of the English department. He is a Princeton graduate and was on the University of Illinois faculty 15 years.

The committee in charge of the inauguration includes Dr. H. G. Townsend, Dr. John F. Bovard and Dr. Ray P. Bowen.
