

WRESTLER SUES FOR MILLION DAMAGES

Everett Marshall Names Publishing House and Six Promoters.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 20.—(AP)—Everett Marshall, claimant of the heavyweight wrestling championship, filed suit today asking a million dollars damages from six promoters, who, he charged, had formed "a monopoly on wrestling" in America.

The Curtis Publishing Co., of Philadelphia also was named a defendant and accused of conspiring with the promoters to "belittle" Marshall's ability and "destroy his standing as a heavyweight title contender" through an article published in the Saturday Evening Post.

Wrestling promoters named in the action, filed in the Franklin county common pleas court, were Jack Curley, New York; Joseph Mottet, Los Angeles; Paul Bowser, Boston; Edward White, Chicago; Thomas Fack, St. Louis, and Ray Fabiani, Philadelphia.

Marshall alleged that on November 29, 1933, the six promoters formed a partnership to promote athletic events, the partnership to continue for 10 years.

The suit declared that the resultant partnership gave the six promoters "a monopoly on wrestling in America," and that the combine barred all outsiders and used only wrestlers managed by the various partners.

ARMY MEN BARRED AS GRID COACHES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Gridiron warriors of the future will have to get their battle orders from civilians. Active army officers will not be permitted to be football mentors, except at West Point.

A war department command effective January 1 bars officers from engaging to act as coaches of civilian universities.

Current agreements under which Captain Lawrence M. (Biff) Jones is coach at Oklahoma University and Major Ralph Sasse, at Mississippi State, are not affected, but they cannot renew contracts.

Shortage of officer personnel is said to have prompted the order, which forces officers to confine their activities to military functions when they are assigned to R. O. T. C. units at schools.

The order is understood to bar officers from even assisting in athletic instruction on a part-time, voluntary basis if this interferes with the regular military instruction work.

General Malin Craig, chief of staff, is said to believe that officers doing college duty have given too much time to athletics.

Major Robert Neyland, a successful coach, recently returned to army duty after serving as football mentor at the University of Tennessee. He is at the canal zone garrison.
