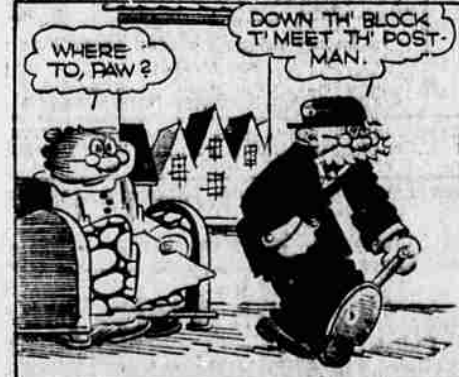

WOOL — BOSTON, Dec. 21.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "The demand for wool has been very moderate again this week, centering especially on the fine and medium territory and Texas types, with a lesser demand for secured wools of medium quality. Prices have ruled generally firm."

"Whether the stronger tone in the foreign primary markets, especially in Australia, has been symptomatic of higher prices after the turn of the year remains to be seen, although it is so interpreted by many. It is less easy to 'trade' on wool this week than last in the world's markets."

"Manufacturers find a new business slow but are making steady deliveries against old contracts. Mohair is quieter but very firm, both here and abroad."
