

BABE RISO LOSES BATTLE TO BRITON

Middleweight King Fails to Survive First Round Against McAvoy.

By ANDY CLARKE (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, Dec. 21 (AP) Jack McAvoy, middle and light heavyweight champion of the British empire, unleashed a torrent of leather against Babe Risko of Syracuse, N. Y., world middleweight champion, and knocked him out in 2:48 of the first round here last night.

A fitly fighter whose face drained white as he leaped from his stool at the opening gong, McAvoy sent Risko to the canvas with his first right hand punch. That punch was the beginning of the end for the Syracuse boy who gained his title, which was not at stake last night, from Teddy Yarros about three months ago.

Risko, who had climbed to his feet five times, made the futile gesture to rise again, as the crowd pleaded with him to get up. He couldn't make it, however, and he settled back as the referee counted him out.

U. S. EXPORTS TO ITALY INCREASED

Neutrality Stand Doesn't Affect Trade; Cotton and Oil Top List. WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Paced by petroleum, exports from the United States to Italy and Italian Africa increased sharply in November, despite this government's efforts to discourage trade with belligerents.

The commerce department reported today that exports to Italy alone during the month amounted to \$9,054,915, compared to \$8,418,608 in November a year ago and \$6,821,366 in October this year. Shipments of petroleum and petroleum products to Italy jumped to \$1,252,000. In the previous month they amounted to \$1,066,000, and in November, 1934, only \$447,000.

An even greater gain in petroleum exports to Italian Africa was noted, shipments of \$451,000 comparing with \$185,000 the previous month and \$12 in November last year. The next wrestling card is scheduled for January 4.

Eastern Team Favored to Win at San Francisco New Year's Day. SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Football's finest yearly collection of collegiate stars assembled in San Francisco today to prepare for the eleventh charity game, New Year's day.

Gridrons from every section in the country contributed one or more of the 44 players who will fight it out on an east-west basis for the benefit of the Shriner's crippled children's hospital. The 22-man eastern squad, with Coach Dick Hanley and Andy Kerr in charge, was installed the favorite even before arrival. Its personnel includes two members of the 1935 all-America team, Riley Smith, Alabama quarterback, and Dick Smith, 220-pound tackle of Minnesota's unbeaten team.

Minnesota's standard also will be carried by Sheldon Belse, backfield ace, and Vernon Oech, 195-pound end. This year's undefeated Princeton eleven was recruited for two ball lugging stars, Paul Paik and Pepper Constable. For the west, Coaches Orin Hollingsbery and Percy Looney called the role on a squad, which, lacking in big names, shaped up nevertheless as gifted with a combination of brawn and speed.

The smallest pair of pants was handed out to Bill "Kayo" Lam, 100-pound University of Colorado halfback, whose off the gridiron activities include tap dancing and the role of master of ceremonies. Lam and Bill Wallace of Rice institute are the swift pikin travelers the west hopes to spring loose at some crucial period of the game.

Thus were the lines drawn taut for a resumption of the explosive-filled economic battle between the league of nations, under British leadership, and Italy over the question of aggression in East Africa. Blacks Claim Victory An Ethiopian government communique issued at Addis Ababa said the vanguard of Ayale's troops on the northern front recaptured Enda Silasi, 30 miles west of Aksum, and Dega Shah, from the Italians.

The Italian losses were considerable," said the communique. "Our troops captured ten tanks." The action occurred six days ago. The two villages are about 35 miles north of the Takkae river site, where a bitter three-day battle was waged early this week.
