Nazi Yule Fete Takes On Military Flavor

BERLIN, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Woden, the old German god of war, rather than the prince of peace, dominated the scene of Germany's strangest yuletide celebration last night.

The German tank corps barracks at Wundsdorf near Berlin observed Christmas in a new "heroic" form.

After dinner, the barracks doors were flung open and with a deafening din, a motor cycle squad roared out. The cycles were ridden by "angels" in the traditional white robes with wings—but wearing steel helmets.

They circled a Christmas tree to the accompaniment of salvoes of machine gun fire.

Then Santa Claus, in the full traditional costume, arrived. He was mounted on a tank between the barrels of two machine guns.

Santa distributed his gifts. They were little models of tanks which soon were cruising about the festive banquet tables.

YULE GIFTS POUR INTO WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Gifts from all over the country poured in to the White House today, including foodstuffs in increasing volume.

As in previous years, they included presents from many people unknown to the White House family as well as gifts from personal friends. The packages were stored away, to be opened Christmas day.

Many of the gifts usually are little home made articles from well wishers but occasionally elaborate and expensive presents are sent by people unacquainted with the president. President and Mrs. Roosevelt have made it their custom to return such expensive gifts.

Plenty of Christmas food was assured by gifts of a deer, turkeys, pheasants and ducks.

On Christmas eve the president and Mrs. Roosevelt will cross Pennsylvania avenue to Lafayette park where the chief executive will light the national capital's community Christmas tree and speak briefly.

After a family dinner, the president will observe an annual custom of years' standing by reading Dickens' Christmas Carol aloud to the family.

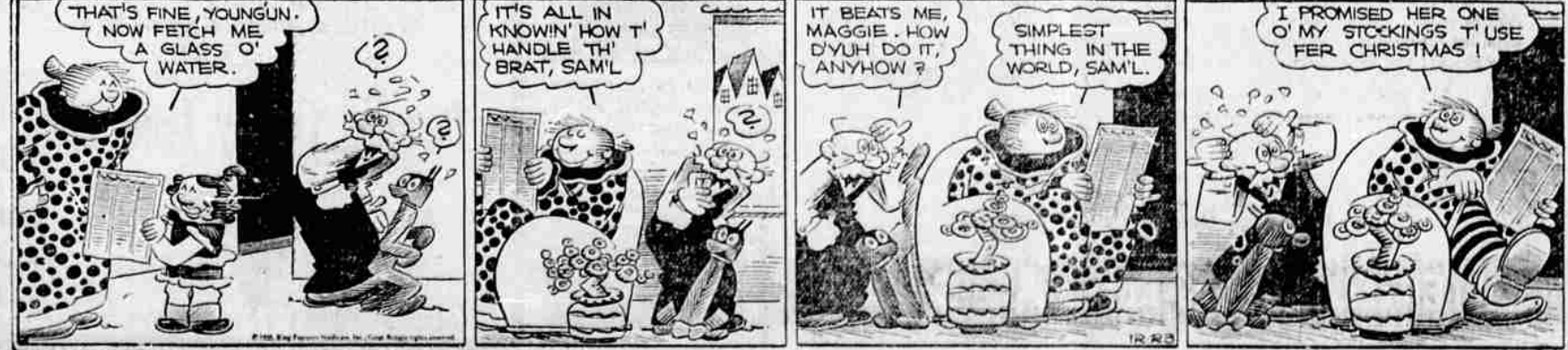
