

# Three Countries Make History During Year

## INTENSE NATIONALISM IS FACTOR IN LEADING ENTIRE WORLD TO VERGE OF WAR

NEW YORK, Dec. 24.—(AP)—The most important developments of the past year abroad revolved mainly about three countries—Germany, Italy and Japan.

Mussolini was the outstanding personality. It is of more than passing interest to note that Germany and Italy are ruled by dictators, and that the emperor of Japan is virtually an absolute monarch. In all three countries intense nationalism is the slogan of the day; all have been busy greatly strengthening their armies and navies; all have declared for territorial expansion, and Japan and Italy have actually undertaken it, the former in China and the latter in Ethiopia; Japan and Germany have resigned from the league of nations, and Italy was outlawed by the league on a charge of armed aggression against Ethiopia.

The ten principal events abroad would seem to the writer to be:  
1. The Italo-Ethiopian war. The great Mussolini has outgrown the narrow confines of Italy and is reaching out for new worlds to conquer. We have here the possibilities of a European and perhaps world war, the danger of uprisings of colored races against their white overlords, and a challenge to Britain's domination of the Mediterranean and consequently a threat to the security of the British empire.  
2. Hitler's scrapping of the Versailles treaty, with the announcement of a quadrupling of the German army, and naval increases. This move resulted in a universal armament race, which involved even the United States.

3. The outlawing of Italy and the application of punitive sanctions by the league of nations as the result of the Italo-Ethiopian war. Such concerted action against an alleged aggressor was unique in history. Many experts hold that the league, created through the efforts of President Woodrow Wilson to preserve peace and protect small nations, must if it does not succeed in bringing Mussolini to reasonable terms.  
4. Japan's support, military and otherwise, of an autonomous North China. This move is claimed by many Chinese to be merely the first step by Japan towards annexation of this rich and populous territory, to be added to Japanese controlled Manchukuo. If this be true, it not only represents further Japanese territorial expansion at the expense of China, but is another challenge to western interests in the far east, especially those of the United States and Great Britain.

5. Germany's continued drive to eliminate Jews from the life of the nation. This is one of the most amazing and far-reaching experiments of its kind in history. With this must be included Hitler's program of bringing the churches, both Catholic and Protestant, under the complete domination of the state, and rigidly restricting their operations and prerogatives.  
6. The establishment of the Philippine commonwealth preparatory to absolute independence. These islands, rich in natural wealth and of vast importance strategically, may easily become a bone of fierce contention among great naval powers. Japan, of course, looms on the horizon, in the view of many observers.

7. Mussolini's inauguration on February 1 of compulsory military training and service for all Italian males between the ages of 18 and 33. Officers in uniform are entering the schools to instill into the minds of little lads of the marble-shooting age a militaristic spirit and impart knowledge of warfare.  
8. The restoration of King George of Greece to his throne. This tends to strengthen other monarchies, some of which have been exceedingly shaky, and may have a marked effect in influencing further restorations, as in Austria, for example. Also King George's apparent friendship for Britain and France may act as a drag on the eastern extension of Italian influence in the Mediterranean. A vital question, of course, is whether King George possesses sufficient leadership to maintain himself as ruler.

9. The London naval conference. This meeting of the great powers to try to limit the sizes of navies was generally expected to fail, owing to Japan's demand for parity with America and Britain. Failure would be the starting gun for a great naval armament race, costing untold billions in money and pointing the way to war.  
10. The institution of the trans-Pacific air-mail service between San Francisco and Manila. Not only does this represent an epochal stride in communications, but it provides the nucleus for the creation of a strategic aerial war machine, should the occasion arise. Japan already has expressed worry over the situation.

Along with the above events should be mentioned the death of Marshal Pilsudski, Polish dictator and creator of the powerful new Polish army; the death of General Juan Vicente Gomez, for 25 years iron-handed dictator of Venezuela, previously a land stricken with revolutions and poverty, but for the quarter century under Gomez peaceful and prosperous; the return of the rich Saar basin to Germany in the January plebiscite; the end of the fifty year old war between Bolivia and Paraguay in the green hell of the Chaco; and the Egyptian political upheaval attended by bloody riots against British domination, forcing England to grant a return to constitutional government.

Other Events Listed  
From the dramatic and human interest standpoint, the list of events would vary considerably from the above.  
1. The Italo-Ethiopian war, of course, with those outstanding and colorful figures, Emperor Haile Selassie and Mussolini.  
2. Continuation of the almost daily story of the Dionne quintuplets, the sweethearts of Canada, and the United States, who ended the year by acquiring the status of full-fledged movie stars.  
3. The silver jubilee of the reign of King George of England, splashed with the color of old-world imperial grandeur and attended by empire wide celebrations.  
4. The shocking but theatrical death of glamorous Prince Alexis Milutin, divorced husband of Marie Hutton, the Woolworth millionaire's daughter, in an automobile accident.  
5. The tragic death of Queen Astrid of Belgium in Switzerland in the crash of a motorcar driven by her husband.  
6. Cruise of the French liner Normandie—the greatest ship ever to go down the ways into the sea in its record breaking run across the Atlantic.  
7. The beheading in Berlin of two German noblemen as spies, Benita von Falkenhayn and Reinhold von Natzmer, fascinating members of old, distinguished families, famous in Prussian history.  
8. Hitler's drive on Jews and the churches, mentioned in the ten important events.  
9. The airplane suicide in England of two prominent young American girls, the Misses Jane and Elizabeth duBois, daughters of Coert du Bois, American consul general at Naples. Heartbroken over the death of their sweethearts, two British air force officers who were killed in the crash of a flying boat, the girls chartered an airplane and when it was 3,000 feet above the green fields of England, stepped out of the door, clasped in each other's arms. The spectacular come-back of Helen Wills in the tennis championships at Wimbledon, England, when she defeated her California rival Helen Jacobs and regained her crown as queen of the courts.
