Story of the Carol

By Prof. Peter W. Dykema, Columbia University, New York

Charles Wesley (1707-88), younger brother of John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist denomination, shares with Isaac Watts the honor of being the greatest producer of hymns. Wesley is credited with the authorship of over six thousand hymns, including such favorites as "Love Divine," "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name," and "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing." The original hymn was published in Christ our Lord is Risen Today, 1739 and has undergone many changes in the hymn book just mentioned.

The music is by that distinguished Jewish composer Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy (1809-1847) and hence was written long after Wesley died. It is an apt setting for the text, and raises to a high point of exaltation the glorious song of the heavenly hosts.

For ever and for evermore.

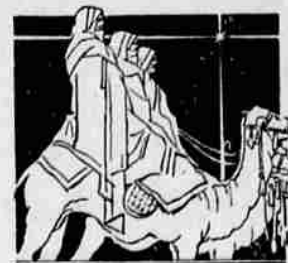
CHRISTMAS MUSINGS
