

MOSCRIP TO PLAY AGAINST MUSTANGS

Injured Stanford End Will See Limited Action in Rose Bowl Game.

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 26.—(AP)—James "Monk" Moscrip, brilliant left end who has been nursing an injured knee for the past month, will start for Stanford against Southern Methodist's undefeated Mustangs in the Rose bowl New Year's day.

Coach Thornhill made that statement last night before leaving with part of his squad of 39 for Pasadena.

Moscrip's torn knee cartilage has shown definite improvement in the past three days, Thornhill said. The ace place kicker, who won three games with field goals this season, will start, although Team Physician Fritz Roth says his knee will permit him to play "not more than 15 minutes—probably less."

Thornhill commented that his team has a "very good chance" to break their losing streak at Pasadena and it's the Indians "win a Rose bowl game for a change." Stanford will be the "underdog"—exactly what Thornhill hoped for.

The same team that has opened every contest this season will start against the Mustangs in the big classic, the head coach announced. He will have Moscrip and Keith Topping at the flanks, Reynolds and Beedle at tackles, Adams and Roubie, guards, and Wes Muller at center.

Sophomore Bill Paulman will be a quarterback, little Jimmy Coffey at left half, "Bones" Hamilton right half, with All-American Bobby Grayson at fullback, Thornhill said.

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 26.—(AP)—A warning that "we're not going to any tea party" was handed out to the Southern Methodist Mustangs today as they prepared to leave for the Rose bowl game at Pasadena, Calif.

OFFERS ADVICE FOR EXTRA POINT KICK

VAUGHN'S BAT TOPS NATIONAL LEAGUE

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—(AP)—Floyd (Arky) Vaughan, shortstop of the Pittsburgh Pirates, was the leading slugger and the leading hitter of the National league in the 1935 season.

Vaughan, whose batting average was .355, banged out a slugging percentage of .607 by making his 192 hits go for a total of 303 bases in 499 times at bat.

The "miscellaneous" records for the season, made public today, also disclose that Vaughan drew more bases on balls than any other National league player, 97, and that he hit into only five double plays. It was his second straight year as leader in walks.

Joe Medwick of St. Louis, second in the batting race, also was the second best slugger with a .574 average, although his total base figure, 365, was the highest in the league. Mel Ott of the Giants was third with 355 and Wally Berger, much sought Boston batter, fourth at 348.

Berger proved the most effective clutter, batting in 130 runs, four more than Medwick. Ernie Lombard, big Cincinnati catcher, struck out only six times in 120 games while Dolph Camilli of the Phillies set a new league record by whiffing 113 times.
