NURSE MARTYR TO MEDICAL SCIENCE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—(AP)—Medical science claimed the life Christmas night of Anna Pabst, young laboratory assistant at the National Institute of Health, who contracted meningitis in line of duty.

Miss Pabst, an experienced technician and co-author of several scientific articles, was inoculating an animal with meningitis culture December 17, when the animal moved and some of the culture squirted into her eye.

Though all possible immediate steps were taken to cleanse the eye from the deadly injection, Miss Pabst contracted the disease.

The public health service, reporting her death in line of duty today, paid highest tribute to the service of Miss Pabst.

Here is the sixth death in the past ten years from diseases contracted in that laboratory by scientists. Many have suffered serious illness.

He was arraigned in the justice court of Judge M. H. EX-ARMY OFFICER TO LECTURE HERE

Lieutenant C. Vincent Hall, retired and disabled United States army officer, world traveler and lecturer, will address the congregation at the First Christian church at 10:35 a. m. Sunday.
