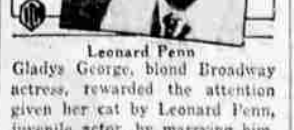
Weds Cat's Friend

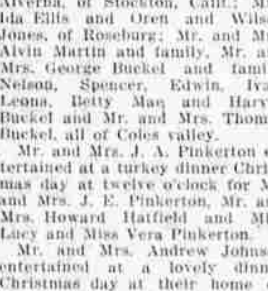
