LIQUOR AGENCY INCREASES TABOO

PORTLAND, Dec. 27.—(AP)—The Oregon liquor control commission denied applications today for seven more liquor store agencies in Portland and four in up-state communities. The commission ruled that the system needs no more outlets at present.

No definite action was taken by the commission at the end of a discussion with H. C. Blackmer, Klamath district attorney, over suggested improvements in handling the sale of beer at Chiloquin, on the Klamath Indian reservation.

The commission revoked the license of Eckert's beer garden, north of the city limits of Salem. The reason given for the action was that the commission considered the place was operated in a disorderly manner.

PENDLETON, Ore., Dec. 27.—(AP)—Ed Pillars, 68, negro, was sentenced here today to one year in the penitentiary on a plea of guilty to assault with a dangerous weapon.

He confessed to stabbing Willie Elk, 28, Unatilla reservation Indian, Tuesday night in an argument over a jug of beer, according to officers. Hospital attendants state that Elk, who was stabbed in the stomach, will recover.

Homer's Story of Fall of Troy Given Added Confirmation by Discoveries in 7th of 9 Cities Built on Single Site

CINCINNATI, Dec. 26.—(AP)—Archaeologists of the University of Cincinnati reported added confirmation today of Homer's story of the fall of Troy.

They announced a third of hope that next year they would uncover magnificent stonework to typify the height of Trojan grandeur.

Their announcement of conclusions after four years of burrowing in ruins in Asia minor did not enter into the Homer's story of the dispute that ended in the fall of Troy. But it said they were convinced that Homer's Troy was the seventh of nine cities that rose and fell on the site; and they reported the finding of bones they said likely were those of a victim of the Greek onslaught to revenge Helen's abduction.

Earlier it had been held that Homer's Troy was the sixth settlement of those flourishing, one after the other, on the site of a pre-historic village.

"We concluded from a study of the architectural and ceramic evidence," said Dr. Carl W. Blegen, field director of the archeological research, "that the sixth Troy came to its end, probably in a severe earthquake, not long after 1300 B. C."

"We concluded that the early seventh Troy, which immediately succeeded and was constructed to
