CHORUS GIRL DIES IN 3-STORY DROP

BUFFALO, N. Y., Dec. 28. (AP)—The broken body of a chorus girl was found today in an alley three stories below an open window of the hotel where she lived.

Police said she was Helen Lowers, 18, of Greenville, Ohio, who had played here since September. Medical Examiner Rocco de Dominis said evidence indicated the girl leaped to her death.

Mrs. Jean Schoening, a San Francisco nurse, loaned a patient \$2.50 a year ago, and heard no more about it until, brimming with Christmas spirit, the borrower called and gave her a check for \$5. Mrs. Schoening refused to accept the check without giving \$2.50 change. The check was returned marked "no account."

TOWNSEND PLAN WARNING VOICED

Set-Up Legal and Attacks Only Boost It, States Professor Witte.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28. (AP)—A contributory system for old age pensions was advocated today by Prof. Edwin E. Witte of the University of Wisconsin at a joint meeting of the American Statistical association and the American Association for Labor Legislation today.

He discussed the Townsend plan and in that connection said: "As I see it, the real danger is not that this country will undertake to pay pensions of \$200 a month to everybody over sixty, nor that the impossibly heavy and viciously unworkable tax, which is the only thing certain in the Townsend plan, will be enacted into law. The real danger is that this country will undertake what no other country has ever attempted, to pay pensions to everybody who reaches a specified age at a flat amount and regardless of need."

"Such a plan may be launched with little opposition well above sixty and a pension rate far below \$200 a month. Even so, it will doom the present economic system and, I believe, inevitably lead to dictatorship. The only practical alternative is a contributory system, under which all, or at least most people will get reasonable annuities upon retirement in old age."

Concerning the constitutionality of the Townsend plan, Prof. Witte said: "Those who gloat that the supreme court may kill all new deal legislation need be reminded that the court has never yet held that congress exceeded its power in making any appropriation and that it is well settled that congress can levy taxes without limit, so long as they are uniform and contain no regulatory features. The Townsend plan is almost certainly constitutional; and the lawyers of the Liberty league in their attacks upon the social security act should be counted as among the most effective propagandists for the Townsend plan."

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

SPRINGFIELD, Dec. 30. (AP)—An attempted recall of city officials, defeated by popular vote, resulted in the filing of a suit in circuit court by J. Bartholomew, city councilman, charging defamation of character. He asked \$20,000 damages from H. E. Maxey, publisher of the Springfield News, and Clifford Wilson, Levi Neet, John Parker, Jess Cross, W. N. Long and Nate Rowe. The statements objected to were assertedly printed in a bulletin.

BURNS, Dec. 30. (AP)—The Harney county experiment station received several varieties of grass and meadow seeds native to Wales. The seeds were donated by J. R. Jenkins, Diamond valley rancher, who said his recent visit to Wales led him to believe the varieties would thrive in this area.

MEDFORD, Dec. 30. (AP)—Fruit shippers here estimated the sale of small "gift boxes" of winter pears this year was double the 1934 shipments. Fifteen thousand boxes were sold. Shipments of fruit from the Rogue river valley this season was declared to exceed 2000 cars.

NORTH BEND, Dec. 30. (AP)—Coos Bay residents will not have to travel to the coastline to see storm warning flags hereafter. Officials of the Oregon-Pacific dock announced a new United States bureau will be established on the wharf here. Flags and a 40-foot pole already have been received.

PORTLAND, Dec. 30. (AP)—Dr. Edwin Augustus Lee, superintendent of schools at San Francisco, said the recent journey of the clipper ship and the construction of the two huge bridges in the Golden Gate area were having a beneficial effect on students. Interest in geography, mathematics and spelling and a wider vocabulary are being developed, he said. Dr. Lee, who attended the Oregon State Teachers' convention last week, also declared that more physicians and dentists are needed and that there would be no surplus teachers if classes were reduced to a more efficient size.

CHINESE GENERAL ATTEMPTS HARIKARI

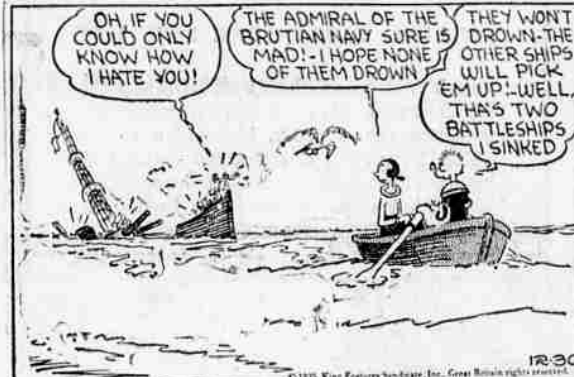

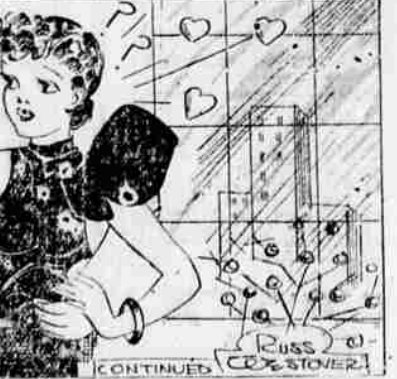

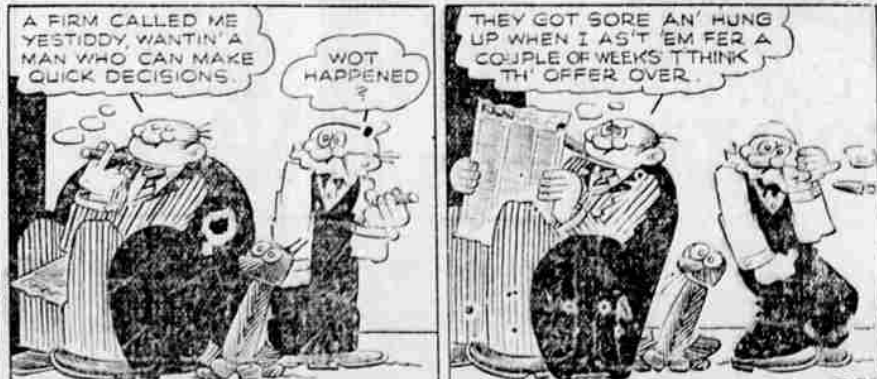
