FARLEY BIDS FOES LOOK AT UPSWING

Critics of New Deal Draw Reply From Democratic Campaign Chief.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—(AP)—The major strategy of New Dealers in replying to their critics in the 1936 campaign will be to say, in effect: "Take a look at the indices of business and employment." This was made plain by Postmaster General Farley last night in a radio speech in which he said: "The constantly rising tide of prosperity is the answer to all the attacks on the Roosevelt administration. In contrast between the state of the nation today and what it was on the advent of Franklin D. Roosevelt to the white house is all the retort required to the sprawling barrage that is proceeding from the republican national committee and being paid for by the special interests that are seeking the return of the system so emphatically repudiated by the people in 1932." Farley was one of several democrats who made pronouncements.

LIMITATION EASED ON GOLD TRADE-IN

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—(AP)—The treasury ruled today that dealers in unmeted scrap gold may now trade in up to 35 Troy ounces without holding a federal gold license.

The ruling, which was in the form of an amendment to the gold reserve act regulations, removed some of the restrictions on dealings in gold for industrial, professional and artistic purposes.

Small manufacturers, jewelers, dentists and other persons engaged in professions requiring the use of gold are permitted by the amendment to acquire the metal in any form up to a quantity not to exceed 35 Troy ounces.

Dealers likewise are permitted, without a federal gold license, to deal in unmeted scrap gold, provided the amount of such gold together with all other gold held by any person at any one time does not exceed 35 Troy ounces.

The ruling, treasury officials said, would affect the majority of 23,000 licensed dealers in the United States.

The old regulation, which the present one supersedes, permitted manufacturers, jewelers, dentists and other persons to acquire gold up to 25 ounces without the necessity of obtaining a federal gold license.

JACKSON TO HEAD CHEMAWA SCHOOL

KLAMATH FALLS, Dec. 31.—(AP)—Paul T. Jackson, away on leave from the principalship of Klamath union high school, has tendered his resignation to become superintendent of the Chemawa Indian school near Salem.

This was learned here today from members of the high school board.

At present Jackson is head of the national youth administration for Oregon with offices in Portland. He asked for a leave of absence in order to take that post.

SHORE OF CURRY CUT BACK BY SEA

GOLD BEACH, Ore., Dec. 31.—(AP)—Huge waves stirred by gales and high winter tides have cut back as much as 50 feet in places along the shore line near here. Breakers have leaped over the banks and overflowed areas which had been dry for decades.

Logs, apparently buried for many years, have been washed out of the sand and tossed farther back on the wide sand shelf just west of Gold Beach.

MAD DOG'S BITES PRODUCE RABIES

OREGON CITY, Ore., Dec. 31.—(AP)—Dr. Courtney Smith, county health officer, clamped a dog quarantine on the town of Sandy where two children today were undergoing pasteur treatment for rabies after being bitten by a mad dog.

Dogs of the district must be either leashed, muzzled or kept indoors for three months, Dr. Smith said.

FARM LOAN ASSN. MEET DATED HERE

All local farmers who are members and stockholders of the Roseburg National Farm Loan association are urged by Secretary-Treasurer R. L. Irving to attend the annual business meeting of their organization at the city hall in Roseburg on January 16 at 10 o'clock.

Stockholding members will receive a full report on the operations of their association during the past year and will elect their board of directors for 1936. Each member is entitled to one vote for each share of stock owned, but no shareholder may cast more than 30 votes regardless of the number of shares held.

"The success of any cooperative enterprise depends a lot on how well informed its members are," Mr. Irving points out. "That is why we hope all stockholders will attend their annual meeting and take full part in the proceedings."

The Roseburg National Farm Loan association is the local cooperative business organization through which farmers obtain long-term mortgage loans from the Federal Land bank at Spokane. Member-borrowers own stock in their association on the basis of one \$5 share for each \$100 borrowed, and the association in turn has a corresponding investment in the capital stock of the land bank.

The stock is pledged as additional security to loans which the association approves.

In this cooperative way, member-borrowers have obtained approximately \$600,000 in mortgage loans through the association on favorable repayment terms at low actual cost.

MILLIONS SAVED BY FARM CREDIT UNITS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—(AP)—The farm credit administration reported today 826 federal charters for co-operative credit unions were granted during 1935.

During the year, the FCA said, approximately 600 other unions were organized under state laws. Approximately 100,000 members of the federal unions were reported to have saved more than \$2,000,000 this year, while the 800,000 members of both state and federal unions saved more than \$50,000,000.

FRANCE CONTINUES U. S. FRUIT QUOTA

PARIS, Dec. 31.—(AP)—France indicated today it will continue restrictions on foreign foodstuffs in 1936, limiting the United States apple and pear quota to 22,000 tons for the first quarter of the year.

Grains, meats, fats and oils also are restricted in the minister of agriculture's quota chart, with no quotas for tinned meats and fresh frozen beef.

The few changes in the 1935 quotas all were slight reductions.
