## SNOW SHUTS OFF CRATER LAKE PARK

KLAMATH FALLS, Jan. 2.—(AP)—All roads into Crater lake park were closed today following a deep snowfall through the night. There is a blanket of 72 inches at Government camp. Fourteen inches of new snow fell on Sun mountain pass. Three inches of wet, slushy snow choked the streets of Klamath Falls.

BEND, Ore., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Rain virtually flowed from the skies here last night while a snow storm raged at Sun mountain pass between here and Klamath Falls. Nearly an inch and a half of rain fell during the 24-hour period ending this morning.

Motorists arriving from the south reported heavy snows on the Sun mountain pass of The Dalles-California highway. The storm had abated in Bend, today, but heavy snow continued to swirl in the mountains to the south and to the west of here.

The rain extended northward into Jefferson county's wheat areas, but was only about a third as heavy as that recorded here.

**NO FIED TEMPERANCE CRUSADER PASSES**—LONDON, Jan. 2.—(AP)—F. N. Charrington, 85, prominent temperance leader, died today. Charrington resigned a position in his father's brewery because, he said, holding it was contrary to his conscience. He sacrificed a fortune, estimated at more than 1,250,000 pounds (about \$2,500,000) and devoted his life largely to temperance work.

He removed the speaker's mace from the house of commons, May 18, 1915, as a protest against a proposed bill which he claimed would have made the British public partners in the liquor traffic.

He regularly gave a free tea on Sunday afternoons for 700 hungry men and women.

**TRAIN CREW SAVES DOG HELD IN FENCE**—CAMBRIDGE, O., Jan. 2.—(AP)—A Pennsylvania freight train arrived late today, because the crew had stopped to untangle a dog from a wire fence that had held it since Sunday while temperature dropped to 14 below zero.

The crew said they noticed a beagle bound hanging by its hind legs Sunday but thought the animal dead. On the return trip, however, one of the men saw the dog's head move.

The railroaders brought the dog here where a veterinarian fed and treated it. The crew said they would adopt the animal.

**JAIL TERM GIVEN TO GROVER NORRIS**—LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Grocer George W. Norris, who in 1929 attempted to oppose U. S. Senator George W. Norris in his campaign for re-election today was sentenced to three months in jail and fined \$100 for perjury in connection with his testimony before a U. S. senate investigating committee.

The grocer served notice of appeal and was released on \$1500 bond.

The grocer was convicted on two counts of an indictment charging he committed perjury when he told the committee he received no money for agreeing to file in the campaign and that he received no assurance of financial aid.
