DOUGLAS AREA IN CONSERVATION JOB

Resettlement Chief Aim of Program Launched by PWA Officials.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Sixty WPA workers, the vanguard of 1936, launched a conservation program today that will cover 1,220,000 acres along the Pacific coast line.

Burned-over, cut-over and cleared land will be reforested, while recreational facilities are improved. Walter A. Duffy, regional resettlement administration director announced.

The administration will purchase and turn back to forested wilderness as much of the 65,000 acres of county and privately owned land as possible. As many of the 600 families within the area, as will leave, will receive assistance from the RSA.

Located along the west slope of the coastal mountain range and extending westward to the Pacific ocean, the conservation area falls into two units embracing practically the entire Siuslaw national forest. The north unit is in southern Tillamook county, northern Lincoln, western Yamhill and Polk counties. The southern unit includes western Lane, southern Lincoln and a portion of Douglas and Coos counties.

Game refuges will be constructed, streams gaged and pooled to facilitate fish runs, the mouths of coast streams cleared of drift-wood and sand bars, and trails, lookout stations, hunters' camps and communication facilities be established.

Shrubs will be cleared, fire lines established and white pine bluster rust control programs launched. "The project is expected to be wholly self-liquidating over a period of time from the standpoint of the timber sale receipts alone," Duffy said.

CONSTITUTION O. K., BORAH DECLARES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—(AP)—An assertion the constitution is adequate now to permit social security and labor legislation was made today by Senator Borah.

The Idahoan, among the foremost in the discussion as republican presidential nominee, asserted at a press conference that "in my opinion effective social security legislation can be had under the present constitution."

Similarly, he said, the labor legislation could be drafted. He declined to say in advance of a supreme court decision whether he believed the Wagner labor disputes act was constitutional.

The senator's statements were made in connection with an article he has written for the February issue of Red Book magazine, giving his views on the supreme court. In the article, he criticized those he described as claiming the constitution is "antiquated" and held that in his opinion the constitution stood as a bulwark against fascism and communism.

'THE INFORMER' PUT FIRST OF '35 FILMS

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—(AP)—"The Informer" is the unanimous choice of the New York film critics, an organization including virtually all daily newspaper reviewers in the city, as the best moving picture of 1935.

Other selections announced today, the first of the newly organized group, were:

Best masculine performance of the year—Charles Laughton in "Mutiny on the Bounty" and in "Ruggles of Red Gap."

Best feminine performance of the year—Greta Garbo in "Anna Karenina."

COACH VAN VLIET ACCEPTS NEW JOB

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Maurice Van Vliet, former football and basketball star at University of Oregon, accepted a position as instructor of physical education and athletic coach at University of British Columbia at Vancouver.

He will coach football next fall. The past football season he coached at University high here.

RECOVERY PROGRAM COSTS 16 BILLION

Portion Represents Loans Which Are Being Paid Back to Treasury.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—(AP)—While President Roosevelt shaped his spending program for the future today, a year-end recapitulation showed the new deal had spent or loaned more than \$16,000,000,000 for relief and recovery.

Part of this represents loans upon which federal officials say they will recover in the main. Some has already come back to the treasury.

Treasury figures showed, also, that almost \$7,000,000,000 of appropriated funds remained unexpended at the end of the year, including a bulk of the \$4,000,000,000 work relief fund and almost \$2,000,000,000 in the Reconstruction Finance corporation.

This was a "kitty" upon which the president could plan his relief and recovery expenditures for the future.

Counted in the total of \$16,000,000,000 already spent or loaned for recovery were more than \$4,000,000,000 loaned by the Home Owners Loan corporation and the Federal Farm Mortgage corporation, but not taken from the treasury.

This money was raised through the sale of bonds guaranteed by the government, and upon which the government has a contingent liability, but is not the original debt.

The grand total also was enhanced by loans from revolving funds, by which the same funds were used over and over again.

The latest treasury statement of expenditures for recovery and relief showed a total of \$12,400,000,000 which did not include the activities of the farm and city mortgage loans.

This total also included some expenditures of the Hoover administration through the Reconstruction Finance corporation, but did not take into account the duplicate loans from the same revolving fund.

Spending Peak Passed. President Roosevelt has promised the peak of spending has passed. He has not hinted at the size of the appropriation he will ask next year for relief, but all indications have been that it will be sharply reduced.

A recapitulation of the past expenditures, shows, however, that relief expenditures have been only a part of the huge drain on the treasury during the depression years. Agricultural aid has bulked large, along with loans to industry.

Including unexpended balances, most of which have been allocated, federal funds have gone as follows:

For agricultural aid, more than \$3,500,000,000; for relief, chiefly direct, more than \$2,500,000,000; for public works, including this year's work relief, almost \$5,500,000,000; for home ownership aid, exclusive of the contingent liabilities, \$750,000,000; and for miscellaneous purposes such as federal deposit insurance, the RFC and the TVA, about \$5,000,000,000.

FOOTBALL ACES TO INVADE HONOLULU

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Headed by two great all-Americans—Stanford's Bobby Grayson and Southern Methodist's Bobby Wilson—a squad of football aces will sail from Los Angeles Saturday for a Hawaiian invasion.

The team, announced here by Manager Paul Ford, includes nine Stanford and three S. M. U. players, with a scattering from other schools. Under the coaching of Glenn Schober of Temple University, the players will meet the Honolulu town team January 11 or 12 and perhaps another Hawaiian game.

U. OF O. QUINTET AGAIN BEATS SONS

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 3.—(AP)—The University of Oregon basketball team defeated Southern Oregon normal 45 to 20 here last night to bring its string of consecutive road-trip victories to six. The game marked the third time within a week the University Camera have beaten the SONS.

Other victories have been chalked up within the past few days over Chico State, Utah Aggies and Young Men's Institute of San Francisco.

Patterson, with 12 points, was high-point man last night. They were to return to Eugene today.

OSC BASKETEERS DEFEAT TROJANS

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Oregon state will seek a second straight basketball victory over Southern California tonight in revenge for losing the Pacific Coast conference title to the Trojans a year ago.

The veteran Beavers came from behind last night to tie the score at 39 all as the second-half ended and won, 45-40, in an overtime period.

Although Captain Jack Hupp of the coast champions rang up 14 points for the best individual record, Loren Tuttle, of Oregon State tallied 15 and his teammate, Wally Painsburg, 14.
