INCREASE IN U. S. DETECTIVES ASKED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6—(AP)—President Roosevelt asked today for 397 more detectives, an anti-crime college for district attorneys, and more prison guards to tighten the nation's protection against the lawless.

His 1937 budget recommendations to congress proposed strengthening four major detective agencies with 112 new "G men," 85 new postoffice inspectors, 60 new secret service men and 60 new treasury special agents.

The more than 600 "G men" who would be in the field under the plan would launch a redoubled drive on bank robbers, under a new law extending their investigations to robberies of all banks insured by the federal deposit insurance corporation.

They would pursue violators in newly-opened fields of federal investigation—interstate transportation of stolen property, fleeing from federal custody, interstate "racketeering"—as well as kidnapping, "white slave" trading, and the interstate transportation of stolen automobiles.

The proposed staff of 500 post office inspectors would investigate mail frauds to an extent now impossible.

DAIRY INDUSTRY SEEN ON UPGRADE

TILLAMOOK, Ore., Jan. 6—(AP)—A marked economic improvement in the dairy industry the past year was reported by George H. Fullenwider of Carlton, president of the Oregon Dairymen's association, in his annual message opening the 43rd convention of the group here today.

Fullenwider warned that with improved conditions prevailing, there may be an unwise tendency on the part of farmers to rush into the dairy business. He declared

It is of utmost importance that production be increased only in relation to high quality and assurance of markets.

The president's address was devoted largely to every-day problems of the industry. He said the chief objective of the association must be disease control, more economical production and better marketing through maintenance of high quality, standardization and promotion work.

As to general movements for furthering the agricultural industry, he urged cooperation with other state commodity organizations such as the eastern Oregon wheat league, and livestock associations.

Oregon leads the nation in the percentage of dairy cattle under supervision in the Bangs disease eradication program, Fullenwider said, and he urged full support of the state Bangs disease eradication law which becomes effective next year.

CITY ATTORNEY IS NAMED AT SALEM

SALEM, Jan. 7—(AP)—The council last night elected Paul H. Hendricks, former councilman, as city attorney to succeed Chris J. Kowitz, who had held the position for three years. Hendricks' vacant council seat was filled by Donald A. Young.

The council also passed an ordinance to change zones near the state capitol grounds, permitting construction of the new capitol and federal building.

HOSPITAL PATIENT COMMITS SUICIDE

SALEM, Jan. 7—(AP)—Harry O'Connor, state hospital patient, hanged himself Monday in the basement of the nurses' quarters, hospital officials reported.

O'Connor was received at the hospital in October, 1932, from Multnomah county. His widow and daughter live in Portland.

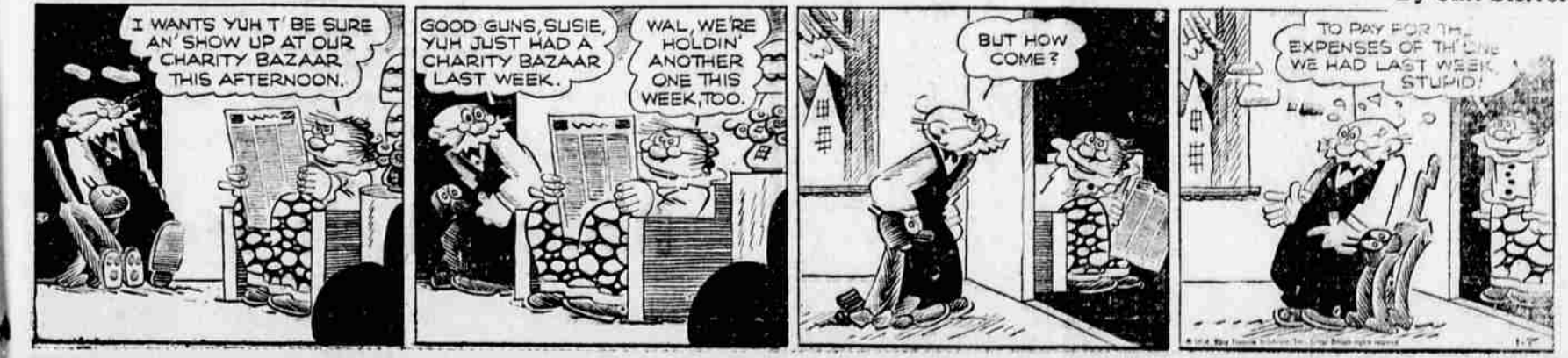
