FARM FAMILIES GET CREDIT ASSISTANCE

Every effort is being made to assist all Douglas county farm families who have been forced on relief or whose credit facilities have been exhausted, announces Paul H. Helweg, local rehabilitation supervisor, reclamation administration, courthouse, Roseburg. Many families have already taken advantage of this assistance and applications of other eligible families to be placed on potentially productive farms will be given immediate attention.

HELP WANTED

Rehabilitation is not relief but a plan to place farmers who have been unduly affected by low farm prices of past years and unexpected reverses to gain a self-supporting basis through adjustment of their debts, setting up a profitable farm plan and supply a loan for capital goods necessary to make the farm a "going" concern, Mr. Helweg says.

Where no extensive debt adjustment or farm plan is necessary, loans for the necessary capital goods such as livestock, seed, feed and equipment can be made in a short time. If more extensive adjustments are necessary, the family can be temporarily placed on subsistence grants until debt re-arrangement and the farm plan be put into effect, the supervisor reports.

"Clients can establish eligibility by being referred to the rehabilitation supervisor through the local relief agency or with a statement from the local credit production association stating that credit facilities have been completely exhausted.

"Families applying for rehabilitation may do so either directly to the office of the local supervisor or through the county relief agency."

Legal Question Dating Back to Founding of U. S. Settled by Decision on AAA

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—A legal argument that has raged since the days of the founding fathers was settled by the supreme court decision on the AAA.

It centered around the clause in the constitution empowering congress to tax and spend for "the general welfare."

In the republic's early days James Madison held that this meant merely that congress could tax and spend for purposes mentioned in the same section of the constitution, such as for raising armies and regulating interstate commerce.

Alexander Hamilton, on the other hand, argued for a broader construction. He said congress could tax and spend for anything—provided it is for the general welfare.

The supreme court yesterday agreed with the broad Hamiltonian view, as expressed by Joseph Story,

an early justice of the court. But the supreme court said it was not now necessary to ascertain the scope of the phrase "general welfare." It threw AAA out on another ground: That it "invades the reserved rights of the states."

The majority opinion of the court said: "Hamilton himself, the leading advocate of broad interpretation of the power to tax and to appropriate for the general welfare, never suggested that any power granted by the constitution could be used for the destruction of local self-government in the states. Story contemplates no such doctrine."

"It seems never to have occurred to them, or to those who have agreed to them, or to those who have agreed of the United States (which has aptly been termed 'an inextinguishable union, composed of inextinguishable states) might be served by obliterating the constituent members of the union."

OREGON CITY, Ore., Jan. 7.—(AP)—The Clackamas county commissioners pointed out proudly today that they more than kept their promise to live within the 1935 budget.

They ended the year with a balance of \$26,500 in contrast to an over-expenditure of \$63,900 the year before, County Auditor Donald C. Bauer reported.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 7.—(AP)—The WPA ruling disqualifying persons who were not on relief between May and October is burdening the direct relief rolls with employables, Klamath relief officials said today.

As a result they said, only \$2900 remains of the \$7100 January allotment for direct relief.
