MORGAN WAR BOND PRESSURE IS CITED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Senate investigators charged today that J. P. Morgan and company brought pressure to bear on American manufacturers to get them to buy a lagging \$500,000,000 issue of war-time British bonds.

Suddenly taking the lead in the senate's investigation after a morning dominated by the Morgan partners, Senator Clark (D., Mo.), introduced a charge from the big banking house to its British agency.

It urged that the British be inspired to ask that American supply houses buy the bonds in return for the war orders they were getting.

On Sept. 30, 1915, after the loan had been approved by the United States government, Morgan called his London house there was "strong opposition" to the loan from German sources in certain sections of the country, notably Chicago.

After noting "we are meeting with a very enthusiastic reception from the leading banking and industrial people in the east," the cable said "there are many large manufacturers here with whom we have not dealt directly, but from whom your munitions of war manufacturers have made large purchases of tools, raw products, etc."

"We hope you can arrange at once to have our largest buyers send cables direct to the most important people from whom they are buying," the message added.

It was suggested that the British buyers point out that success of the loan was vital to American trade and ask that the manufacturers "communicate direct with J. P. Morgan and company at once."

"In the parlance of the street, weren't you putting the heat on the American manufacturers?" Clark demanded.

"We don't use that parlance," retorted Thomas W. Lamont, Morgan partner.

SUSPECT HELD ON WEAPONS CHARGE

OREGON CITY, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Joe Siminofsky of Portland was arraigned in justice court here yesterday and released on \$500 bond on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. State police had been informed that the Oswego State bank was to be robbed. They picked up Siminofsky and a companion, identified only as "John Doe Smith," who were sitting in a parked car near the bank. The man known as Smith was found to have no connection with the case and was released.
