

PUBLIC LIBRARY WELL PATRONIZED

71 Per Cent of Residents of Roseburg Listed as Book Borrowers.

Seventy-one per cent of the residents of Roseburg are borrowers from the Roseburg public library, according to the annual report made by Mrs. Hilda Reizenstein, librarian, to the library board.

The library has been in existence for 15 years, 12 years in its present location, and each year has shown a gain in circulation of books.

During the past year the library circulated 55,218 books, an average of more than 4,600 books per month, with an average of 17 books per borrower for the year. The cost of circulation was 6 cents per book.

There was a total of 3,127 borrowers during the year, a gain of 104 over 1934. Of these borrowers 2,563 were adults and 624 were children.

The library added 1,549 books during the year, of which number, 1,007 were from the library of the late S. D. Evans. The total number of volumes is now 9,577, of which 8,863 are books for adults and 1,114 books for children.

The library's per capita expenditure was 80 cents, of which 57 cents was paid from the allowance granted by the city.

Important gifts to the library during the year were the S. J. Shoemaker yearly gift of \$100, the George W. Kimball bequest of \$2,000, available in 1936; a donation of \$24.67 from the American Legion auxiliary for books on Americanization; 18 books toward the Frank P. Clemens memorial; 16 books from a Yale university graduate, whose name is withheld by request, five books of poetry from the Delphin Study group, a group of books of fiction from Dr. and Mrs. C. J. Buck, and a three-volume set of Cary's History of Oregon, from Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Ritter.

U. S. POLITICAL OBSERVATIONS

At Smith's return to the open arena of politics has enlivened the democratic scene greatly, although opinions differ as to the ultimate importance of the event.

It is beginning to be understood generally that Mr. Smith's objections to Mr. Roosevelt and his policies are fundamental, deep-seated, earnest and tinged with a personal enmity which almost surpasses the bounds of ordinary language.

The conviction that the break between the two is complete and enduring, on Smith's side at least, arises from several great and small causes.

One is the comparatively minor incident of the rejected White House invitation. Another is Smith's constant devotion to the aims and activities of the Liberty league, now the most active engine of organized effort against Roosevelt, the strongest cause, perhaps, is the now widely-disseminated knowledge of private and semi-private remarks Smith has made about the "new deal."

Putting two and two together, political circles believe that Smith arrived at a perfect fog, denoting clearly that Smith is out to make active and perhaps desperate battle against the administration, and particularly against the head of the administration.

Differ As to Results

What such an opposition may amount to, measured in terms of final results, is a question about which the politicians do not agree. Talk that Smith may try seriously to head off a Roosevelt re-election, perhaps by becoming a candidate himself, has encountered much skepticism among party leaders.

Those who speak of a possible Smith candidacy must know that experience has shown it virtually impossible to break any president's hold on the machinery of his party.

They must recall that even the astute, virile and popular former President Theodore Roosevelt was beaten decisively in just such a battle by the discredited, politically inept President William Howard Taft.

No one calls the present President Roosevelt inept politically, or without popular appeal; in fact, it is Smith whose recent record is most scarred by defeats. The tradition of his great public following suffered greatly in 1928, when he not only lost his own state, but saw the republicans break the solid south. Four years later he fought a pitched convention battle with his old friend, Franklin

MORGAN-BRITISH WAR DEALS TOLD

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—(AP)—More evidence of close teamwork between J. P. Morgan and the British government while this country was debating whether to enter the World war was presented today to the senate munitions committee.

Documents were introduced to show that David Lloyd George, then British finance minister and later premier, intervened to place the Allies' vast American purchases almost exclusively in his hands.

A cablegram by an agent of W. P. Bonwright and Company, of New York, whom sought a contract to make huge purchases in this country for France, also said the English minister of finance had induced the French to give the business to Morgan's Paris agency.

Senators followed the testimony closely, expecting ammunition for the debates expected soon to divide congress over whether a mandatory neutrality policy should be enforced upon the president.

A committee investigator testified Morgan's house sent to the Allies 84 per cent of the arms, steel and steel implements they bought in this country before the United States entered the war.

The huge firm was said to have arranged \$1,843,593,715 of the increase recorded in such exports to Europe in 1915 and the succeeding two years. Its spokesmen have challenged contentions that financial interests prompted the United States to join the Allies in 1917.

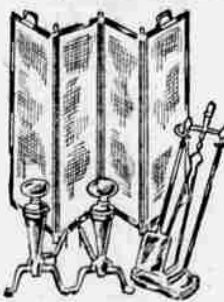

S. P. "SHASTA" TO BE THROUGH TRAIN

"The Shasta" will be operated as an independent through train between Portland and San Francisco via Roseburg, early next month, according to J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, who came to Roseburg yesterday from Portland to attend the annual meeting of the Roseburg chamber of commerce.

This change will eliminate the consolidation of "The Shasta" with another train between Portland and Eugene and between Dunsmuir and San Francisco, which now necessitates switching of cars at those points, and it will have the effect of greatly improving the through service between the north-west and California through southern Oregon.

The schedules of "The Shasta" north and southbound through southern Oregon points will not be materially changed at points in southern Oregon. The arrivals at Portland and San Francisco will be somewhat earlier.

This change is made possible by improved general business conditions and an increased volume of passenger business.

In the late spring or early summer, "The Shasta" will be fully air-conditioned. Ormandy further announced. The latter change is part of the program now being carried out by the Southern Pacific, under which program, coaches, tourist and standard sleepers, diners and observation cars of all principal trains of that company will be air-conditioned for the an-

ticipated heavy increase in passenger requirements for the season 1936.
