Health Talks

The Best Diet

In so far as vegetarianism is practiced as a matter of taste, morals, or esthetics, the practice is not subject to controversy, being purely one of personal preference. But when certain claims are made, they must be proved or withdrawn.

An interesting contribution on this subject has recently come

from the Peiping Union Medical college. At this institution Dr. Wu and his collaborators for more than seven years have studied the effects of exclusive vegetarian diets on certain experimental animals who normally feed on mixed foods.

Dr. Wu found that rats fed exclusively on vegetables grew more slowly than those which are allowed their normal diet. Furthermore, not only do the vegetarian rats develop more slowly, but at maturity they attain a smaller size. The offspring of these rats develop more slowly than did their parents.

The life span of the vegetarian rats was not shorter, nor longer, than that of the normally fed rats, nor were their reproductive powers affected.

The continuation of this diet through many generations did not appear to affect the gross physical make-up, nor to impair the health of the vegetarian animals.

These studies then prove again that a mixed diet is better than one exclusively composed of vegetable foods; also and more particularly, that protein foods of animal derivation are superior to those of vegetable origin.

But even more significant is the "moral" so to say, of these studies, which in the editorial words of the Journal of the American Medical Association points to the fact that a diet so deficient as to be inadequate for growth and reproduction is easily recognized by its effects and is either changed, or the race will perish. However, a diet that is slightly deficient but suffices to propagate the race after a fashion, may never arouse suspicion and hence continues to exert its insidious effects.

a bayonet. Not because of our large area or national resources, for there are nations yet larger in area and in per capita wealth, nor is it due to the ingenuity of the American people, but because we have enjoyed the blessings of the best form of government mankind has yet conceived and devised. And relatively speaking we have been enjoying greater prosperity, greater economic security and greater happiness under our form of government than is to be found at present on any spot on the face of the globe.

Soviet Slavery Cited

"Yet now we are told," Commander Koehn said, "that this constitution of ours is out-moded and out-worn and that we should substitute in lieu thereof the Russian form of government known as communism. This is the result of the result of this experiment in communist controlled Russia? There is not one business enterprise in Russia today in which the workers share the ownership and profits. Nor has the worker any choice as to wages or work. He must also purchase all of life's necessities from the government. The price of this is fixed by the government and the workers wages as fixed by that same government are so worked out as to balance one another. This balance gives him a bare existence and leaves him an utter impossibility for him to accumulate money. He has no share in the profits. His desires and his qualifications mean nothing. He must work and live as commanded. The workers of Russia do not own the empire, all lands and all profits as promised by Lenin when he tricked them into overthrowing the Kerensky government. He must slavishly do as he is told under penalty of losing his employment and card and being dumped into the cauldron of liquidation through starvation. No labor unions are permitted in the soviet union except those that are

sponsored and controlled by the communist party. If any other group institutes a strike they are considered counter revolutionaries and are either exiled or executed by a firing squad.

"Virtual slavery exists in Russia today. One of their first tenets is that there is no God, that religion is a dupe of people, and virtually all the churches and church property have been destroyed and confiscated. Theirs is the policy of the pagan, it is immoral and immoral, a revelation to the dark ages and today those four gaunt horsemen, starvation, poverty, unhappiness and death, stalk rampant through that once fair country."

Would Sever Relations

The speaker drew enthusiastic applause when he said: "We should immediately withdraw diplomatic relations with Russia, for they are now using said diplomatic relations merely as a broad highway along which they can admit their nefarious, filthy propaganda into the United States and make unsuspecting converts amongst our citizens, and every alien or communist in the United States who now advocates the overthrow of our present form of government should be immediately deported."

"To break our present economic depression," he continued, "all immigration should cease for a period of at least 10 years and all aliens who have entered this country illegally should be summarily deported. There are at present some 34 million aliens who have entered our country illegally and if this group could be deported there would be jobs available for millions who are now walking our streets hungry and discouraged, and who do not know from whence their next meal is coming. Furthermore there are over a million aliens on the relief roll today supported by your taxes and mine and every time you admit one more alien you replace one more American among our workers."

Legion Program Stated

"The two outstanding problems or questions before the American people today are to 'find jobs for the ten million unemployed' and 'keep out of war.' The first problem can be solved by total restriction of immigration and the deportation of all aliens who refuse to become citizens of our country and also those who have entered illegally, and the second problem can be solved by the adoption of the American Legion program of peace. The Legion program for peace is as follows: "1. An adequate national defense, not for aggression, but merely to defend ourselves. "2. A universal draft law which will not only draft all the man power, but all the needed wealth and property for the successful prosecution of that war. "3. Strict neutrality in the present European conflict, and all wars which might arise thereafter."
