

R. H. S. Basketeers Battle Myrtle Point High Tonight

GAME TO BE FIRST ON HOME SCHEDULE

Indians Also Dated Against State University Frosh Saturday Night.

The Roseburg senior high school Indians tonight battle the Myrtle Point high school basketeers in the first home conference game of the season. Roseburg has played only one conference game, having won a close contest at North Bend. Coach Paul Warren has been drilling the Indians this week on offense tactics, as well as building up a better defensive system. In order to meet the Myrtle Point team tonight and the University of Oregon freshmen Saturday night.

It is believed that the basket tossing ability of the Indians will show considerable improvement tonight.

The game will start at 8 o'clock, and promises to produce plenty of action.

Two games are on the schedule for Saturday night at the senior high gymnasium.

At 7:30 p. m. the Roseburg B team will meet Oakland high school, as a preliminary to the meeting of the Indians with the University frosh.

The latter game is expected to be somewhat one-sided, due to the greater experience of the university players, and the fact that they are the pick of last year's high school teams of the state. The Indians, however, are working out defense plans in the hope of holding the score as low as possible.

The contest will, it is expected, give fans a fine showing of speedy basketball.

HOPPE LEADS FOR 3-CUSHION TITLE

CHICAGO, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Willie Hoppe of New York, gray-haired and 48 years old, still is the boy wonder of billiards.

The famed New Yorker, who has played championship billiards 29 years through three generations of sport stars, today had a lead of 28 points over Welker Cochran, San Francisco, in his challenge match for the world's three cushion billiard championship. He beat Cochran 60 to 41 in 57 innings in their opening block yesterday afternoon, and polished him off 60 to 51 in 69 innings last night.

This afternoon and tonight they play their third and fourth blocks with the finals tomorrow afternoon and tomorrow night.

Holder of all other championships, Hoppe has never been able to annex the three-cushion crown. His greatest fame came as a balk line champion. He is a present title holder at 18.1. Hoppe seemed in a fair way today to realize his ambition in winning the three-cushion title, judging from his performance in the two opening blocks of the 250 point match.

PREP GRID RULES DUE FOR CHANGES

CHICAGO, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Ways and means of providing additional protection for prep football players were under consideration today as the rules committee of the National Federation of High School Athletic associations met for its annual two-day session.

It was likely, said Henry V. Porter of Chicago, secretary of the committee, that the intermission time between periods would be lengthened. The traditional one minute rest between the first and second, and third and fourth sessions was expected to be increased to two or three minutes, and the 12 minutes between halves boosted to 15.

Porter said statistics indicate that most of the serious injuries on prep grids occur near the start of the second half. Feeling that lack of proper warming up may be partly responsible, coaches in answers to questionnaires, have suggested an extra three minutes between halves, devoted to limbering exercises.

The rule prohibiting roughing, or tackling a ball carrier after he has gone out of bounds, was due for strengthening. Porter said officials in the 14 states which have adopted the national federation code would be told to enforce strictly the anti-roughing rule.

While no drastic changes in the rules were planned, questionnaire responses indicated that the forward passing regulations needed clarification. National federation rules permit passing from anywhere behind the line of scrimmage, and some difficulty with tosses from beyond the line has been encountered.

JOCKEY AND AIDE FREED OF MURDER

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 9.—(AP)—The indictment charging Willie (Smoky) Saunders, jockey who won the 1935 Kentucky derby, with being an accessory to murder of Mrs. Evelyn Silwinski, was dismissed here today in criminal court.

Dismissal followed the acquittal last night of Walter Schaeffer of Chicago Heights, Ill., race track exercise boy of murder of the young woman who was found strangled in a rooming house here last October. Commonwealth's Attorney Meritt O'Neal, in moving dismissal, explained that under Kentucky law it is impossible to convict an accessory when the principal has been acquitted.

A jury acquitted Schaeffer after an hour and 48 minutes' deliberation last night.

ZIMMERMANN AND DREWS TO BATTLE

Canyonville Card Set for Jan. 28 Also to Include Four Other Fights.

A boxing card which gives one appearance of being a "natural" is announced by "Tex" Breedlove, matchmaker for the South Umpqua Rod and Gun club for Tuesday, January 28, at Canyonville.

Headlining the card will be Jack Drews, 155 pounds, athletic instructor at the South Umpqua Falls camp. Drews, a well known Douglas county boxer, was formerly a headliner on Portland cards. He will meet "Buzz" Zimmermann, 159 pounds, speedy Klamath Falls slugger, in an 8-round match.

Speed Bowers of Camp Bradford and Tony King of Portland, each at 130 pounds, will be matched for six rounds.

A special event will be a four-round heavyweight grudge fight between Max Breedlove, 190 pounds, Canyonville, and Buster Carter, 225 pounds, Glendale. Breedlove is six feet three inches tall, while Carter stands six feet six inches. Don Vay, 155, Camp Bradford, will meet Johnny Shaw, 155, Grants Pass, in a four-round match.

In another four-round preliminary, Mack McCullah, 165, Camp Bradford, will fight Chester Dunn, 160, Roseburg.

LIGHTING SYSTEM WILL BE REPAIRED

Temporary repairs are to be made to the city's street lighting system, pending final decision on a recommendation that the system be discarded in favor of bracket lamps. Percy Croft, chairman of the council's committee on electric lights, announced today. Work of repairing the lines, which were short circuited recently, was started this morning.

A proposal has been made that bracket lamps be used to replace the present poles, but such lights would be installed only on one side of the street. Owners of property in the business district are to be interviewed to determine whether this system would be satisfactory to them before the council takes final action, Croft reports.

WORK RELIEF GOAL SHOWN EXCEEDED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—(AP)—President Roosevelt reported to congress today that work relief employment on December 28 totaled 2,541,000 persons or more than the original 2,500,000 goal.

The exhaustive summary of activities under the \$1,000,000,000 appropriation was prepared by the national emergency council. It was submitted in accordance with a provision of the work relief act requiring that a report of expenditures be made before January 10 to the three succeeding congresses. The report said the works program administration accounted for 2,750,000 of those employed on December 28—the remainder by other federal agencies.

The report showed \$2,341,000,000 actually had been "obligated" on a day-to-day basis.
