POLICE ON GUARD AT GILBERT RITES

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 11 — (AP) — The last act of the drama of John Gilbert, idol of the silent screen, is played out today in the tiny chapel of a Beverly Hills mortuary.

Less than a hundred persons were given admission cards to the funeral services for the dashing, 38-year old actor who died Thursday of a heart attack.

Two of the four women Gilbert wooed and married, Virginia Bruce and Leatrice Joy, both actresses, were among the invited mourners.

While keeping the place and hour of interment secret, friends arranged with Beverly Hills police for a cordon of 25 officers to guard the mortuary and direct away the curious. The action was taken to avert mob scenes such as attended the funerals of Rudolph Valentino and L'Vann Tashman.

The bulk of Gilbert's estate, placed in a revised estimate of "around \$400,000," is expected to go to his fourth and last wife, Miss Bruce. His will was said to be unchanged since they were divorced in 1934 after she had borne him a daughter, Leatrice Joy II, his daughter by his second wife, also was said to be remembered in his bequests.

OUTPUT OF GAME TO BE INCREASED

PORTLAND, Jan. 11 — (AP) — Increased production at state game hatcheries and farms appeared in prospect today as a result of the game commission's action in allocating funds for such projects.

The commission, in session here yesterday, adopted a 1936 budget of \$445,452.49 and moved to expend \$40,000 on a game bird program and \$55,520 for hatcheries.

Of the bird project, \$17,230 was set aside for the re-establishment of the Corvallis game farm for pheasants and partridges, \$10,000 for additional water supply at the Pendleton farm and \$2,800 for general improvements at the Eugene branch.

Two new chicken houses at Eugene, to be managed by Superintendent of Farms Gene M. Simpson, will be utilized for raising hens for setting.

Commissioner E. E. Wilson said the Corvallis farm will be "a model of scientific production." It is to be entirely mechanical.

The commission approved plans for a joint meeting with the fish commission and the state's cattlemen in Portland March 13.
