BOSTON, Jan. 11. — (AP) — The Commercial Bulletin today says: "There has been a fair demand for wool this week. Prices are fully maintained on worsted wools and are about two cents higher for scoured wools, much have moved in greater volume. Cloth buyers are inclined to wait the reactions from the AAA decision. Spinners and combers, however, are making fairly good deliveries still."

"The foreign markets are tending upward. Australia is three cents, clean basis, up for the week. South America, also, is dearer."

"A little contracting is reported in northern California at 25-26 cents to the grower."
