**Rough Game of Basketball
Here Results in Score
of 25 to 16.**

Exhibiting a brilliant defense, ably led by Bannister, guard, the Roseburg senior high school Indians defeated Myrtle Point 25 to 16 in a rough game of basketball at the senior high gymnasium here last night. Roseburg's offense play was rugged, but the Indians kept the visitors closely checked with a speedy man-to-man defense which permitted only snap shots at the basket.

Myrtle Point also played a close checking game, while Barklow and Carver, visiting forwards, started on offense play.

Scherner, Roseburg forward, was high point man for the Indians, and converted several sensational shots.

Collins turned in a perfect score on free throws, converting four out of five.

Score at half time was 13 to 8 in Roseburg's favor. The Indians took a spurt in the third period to lead 21 to 12.

Coach Paul Warren used frequent substitutions in order to prevent exhausting his players, who will tonight meet the University of Oregon freshmen at the senior high gymnasium.

LOUIS AND RETZLAFF SHAPING FOR BOUT

CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—(AP)—This was the day for Joe Louis and Charley Retzlaff to demonstrate for members of the Illinois State Athletic commission that they are reaching proper condition for their 15-round battle at the Chicago stadium Jan. 17.

The official group had appointments to watch both boxers do their stuff.

Retzlaff continued to hammer sparring partners yesterday, while Louis took another holiday. Retzlaff did damage when he landed, but appeared to lack speed. He weighed 194 pounds, the figure at which his management intends to have him enter the ring, before yesterday's drill.

Louis, never far off of condition, has taken things easy. He weighs only a few pounds over 200, and may go into action scaling as much as 205. He has devoted much of his training to polishing up an effective defense. He has not, however, neglected to deal out plenty of punishment to his sparring partners.

Louis will receive 37½ per cent of the receipts, which would amount to about \$31,000 if a capacity attendance shows up.

Retzlaff, who gets 17½ per cent, expects to take down his biggest purse, around \$10,000.

seek the detention for questioning of "Jafie"—Dr. John F. Condon, who said suddenly on a South American cruise yesterday.

The governor said he wanted to question Condon about certain features of the case concerning which Condon, in a series of magazine articles entitled "Jafie Tells All," claims to have hitherto undisclosed facts.

The governor is especially interested in Condon's views on the question whether Hauptmann had a confederate.

"Condon goes so far as to write that he knew two of those involved in the Lindbergh baby murder," said the governor. "If Dr. Condon knows these things, I feel the authorities should have the information."

Condon Must Explain

William Conklin, press aide to Governor Hoffman, said today Condon related that in telephone conversation with the ransom taker, he often talked to persons along side him.

Condon also related, Conklin said, that the mysterious "John" often referred to "No. 1" man and "No. 2" man.

"Condon says there was blood on the bedclothing of the crib," Conklin said. "He says that despite the testimony of Colonel Lindbergh and the state police, the ransom note was in the crib and not on the window sill."

"The governor is interested in all these statements, and also in a purported interview which quotes Jafie as saying he was offered \$250,000 to change his story. He wants to know who made the offer."

Quiz Means Delay

The date of Hauptmann's execution has been set for next Friday night, but the boat on which Dr. Condon sailed does not dock at Cristobal until that day. It would be impossible, therefore, to hear Condon's story before the execution date.

Under the law the governor may stay the execution for not longer than 90 days.

As the court of pardons, eight men including the governor, went into session this morning, they soon found that the crowds in the corridors were making so much noise that it interfered with the hearing. The court thereupon adjourned to the chambers of the court of errors and appeals.

C. Lloyd Fisher of defense counsel presented Hauptmann's appeal, the Bronx carpenter having withdrawn several days ago his request for a personal hearing.

State Receptive

The state was not formally opposing the appeal, but Attorney General David T. Wilentz, who prosecuted Hauptmann at Flemington, and Anthony M. Hauck Jr., Hunterdon county prosecutor, were present.

Hauck said that he had no knowledge of any new evidence that would warrant any clemency, but added: "If the governor comes to us with satisfactory new evidence, we would side with the defense counsel and appeal to the court for clemency."

One of the appeals for clemency was made by the Rev. J. Mathieson, Hauptmann's spiritual adviser, who expressed belief in the condemned man's innocence.

Thinks Bruno Had Aid

Strengthening the possibility of a reprieve was the governor's statement before the court began its deliberations:

"I do not believe Bruno Hauptmann was the sole perpetrator of the kidnapping of the Lindbergh baby."

"I do not believe the full ends of justice will have been served with the execution of Hauptmann."

Hauptmann, awaiting the action of the court in his death house cell at the state prison two miles away, was joined by another convicted murderer, the "Jersey Dillinger," Edward Metelski, policeman killer. Metelski is under sentence to die the week of Feb. 17. Hauptmann was still sleeping as the court met.

Mrs. Anna Hauptmann remained at a hotel in seclusion.

STEAMER BEARING CONDON TO DOCK NEXT FRIDAY

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Cristobal, Panama Canal Zone is the first stop of the Grace liner Santa Rita, at which Dr. John F. Condon, the Jafie of the Lindbergh case, could be taken into custody for New Jersey authorities.

The ship which sailed from here last night reaches Cristobal next Friday. Dr. Condon and his daughter, Mrs. Ralph Hacker, planned to visit friends in Panama.

CONDON'S SON-IN-LAW REFUTES "DODGE" HINT

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—Governor Hoffman's announced intention to have Dr. John F. Condon arrested for questioning brought a statement today from Jafie's son-in-law Ralph Hacker, that the Lindbergh ransom intermediary "has been willing to be questioned at all times."

Hacker, whose wife, Myra, sailed last night with her father on the Grace liner Santa Rita for Panama, issued a statement when informed the governor of New Jersey sought Jafie's return to question him concerning statements made in a series of magazine articles and in interviews.

"Dr. Condon has been available for months and has been willing to be questioned at all times. Before leaving on this trip he had an inquiry made of the attorney general if there was any reason why

he should not go at this time and was assured there was not. If there was any necessity to ask Dr. Condon any questions that decision could have been reached before he sailed."

Condon Always Willing

Hacker, Fort Lee, N. J., architect, said that so far as he knows Governor Hoffman made no effort to question the doctor. Hacker said Dr. Condon said recently he would be willing to appear before the board of pardons which today heard Bruno Hauptmann's plea for clemency.

No stock had been taken by those close to the family who knew of the incident in the purported effort to bribe Dr. Condon. The governor said he was interested in an interview quoting Dr. Condon as saying he was offered \$250,000 to change his story.

The incident, other sources said, apparently occurred at the doctor's office at his summer home on City Island, near the Bronx. Several weeks ago a man called there and said it would be worth a lot of money to Dr. Condon if he would change his story about Hauptmann. The man spoke incoherently and Dr. Condon was understood to have laughingly dismissed it.

Hacker reiterated that Dr. Condon had departed for a rest and because Mrs. Hacker was in ill health.

HARD QUAKE FELT AT GREAT FALLS

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Jan. 11.—(AP)—An earth shock, felt as "hard" and accompanied by a rumble was felt in Great Falls at 11:04 a. m. today.

Authorities began a check to see if there had been any damage.

At Helena, Montana capital about 100 miles south, there was no shock, the weather bureau reported there.

Quakes which caused heavy damage in Helena last October often were felt at Great Falls but caused no appreciable damage. Property losses in Helena at that time, however, were estimated as high as \$4,000,000.

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

PORTLAND, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Attorney Lee Boyer, acting for the estate of the late William Lillioff, filed suit here for \$10,000. The case resulted from the death of 22 persons who drank "dehorn" in 1934.

Boyer was named administrator for the estates of 21 of the victims. Defendants include drug stores, a paint company and employees of the firms which allegedly sold denatured alcohol.

EUGENE, Jan. 10.—Election of a "little colonel," a co-ed chosen by the University of Oregon as guest of honor at the Seaboard and Blade military ball here Saturday night received the condemnation of the Y.M.C.A. council.

The council decried what it termed "popularization of militarism." William Paddock, Portland, said the resolution was "absurd." Paddock is chairman of the ball.

ST. HELENS, Jan. 10.—Dr. L. G. Ross might claim a record of continuity in office. He has served as Columbia county's health officer for 25 years and was recently reappointed by the county court.

MEDFORD, Jan. 10.—No "Townsend candidate" will be supported unless he is "100 per cent" for the revolving pension plan, H. E. Wirth, Townsend leader and independent candidate for governor at the last election, said in a public statement here.

PORTLAND, Jan. 10.—Russell M. Colwell, vice president of the First National bank of Portland, said in an interview that the east appears confident Governor Landon of Kansas will be the republican presidential nominee. Colwell returned yesterday from the east coast. He also said "the supreme court decision throwing out the AAA assures the defeat of President Roosevelt next fall."

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10.—(AP)—A quarantine on dogs in Multnomah and Clackamas counties was imposed by the state department of agriculture for a 90-day period. Rabies has been discovered in the two counties.

The federal government when the property was deeded to the veterans administration and made a part of the veterans facility here. The buildings and grounds were loaned by the veterans administration to the relief administration to be used as a home and hospital for transient single men when the transient bureau was first organized.

Since the home was instituted in 1934 it has provided accommodations for approximately 1100 transient single men.

The institution has been an important asset to the city of Roseburg, expenditures during the year 1935 having amounted to more than \$56,000. An appropriation of \$125,000 was authorized for the home for the year 1936.

ACCORD ON NEW FARM PROGRAM NEARS AT MEET

desirable to proceed toward production control through subsidized soil conservation.

Though nothing is considered settled, word from the farmers' meeting indicated delegates were centering on a soil conservation plan to be implemented with cash from the government.

In the view of several farmers attending the session, soil conservation might result in control of production. For instance, they said, a farmer might retire a percentage of his land from commercial crops and plant it to soil-building legumes, receiving government money for so doing. The result, advocates say, would be controlled production of commercial crops and sustained prices for them.

Administrator Davis has said that he personally prefers a com-

posite soil conservation program, plus some form of domestic allotment plan to provide immediate cash aid to farmers. Experts say that under a domestic allotment plan, the government might fix quotas on portions of crops to be sold for domestic consumption. Farmers might then receive subsidies on these quotas.

There was said to be strong sentiment in the conference against seeking constitutional amendment to validate such plans as AAA.

Norris Is Critical

However, debate over amendments went on elsewhere. Senator Norris (R., Neb.), declaring that the supreme court's AAA decision has "absurd consequences," suggested the court be required to reach unanimity before it strikes down a law.

Representative Wadsworth (R., N. Y.) challenged President Roosevelt to seek an amendment, saying that any such attempt would meet defeat by "an enormous majority" of the people.

In addition to the estimated costs for grading, paving and improving, expenditures of \$85,000 will be necessary for rights of way and \$20,000 for the construction of bridges across the Winchester, Davis, Pass and Sutherland creeks.

With the exception of the Sutherland-Roseburg stretch, which calls for widened pavement, and the Roseburg-Kelley's Corner section which program calls for grading, paving and crossings, all of the projects listed are for new grading and paving.

The report of the state highway commission clearly shows the necessity for the expenditure of more than \$200,000 to modernize the Pacific highway from Portland to Ashland to meet present day traffic requirements, yet the projects in the Roseburg sector are given no better than second consideration.

C. A. Ayre, secretary-manager of the highway association, revealed.

Unfairness Charged

"Roseburg residents, property owners and business interests are being penalized in excess of 40 per cent of the tourist traffic because of the present condition of the Pacific highway," Secretary Ayre said. "Traffic counts taken by the highway commission show that nearly half the out-of-state cars coming into Grants Pass either turn back or select alternate
