R.H.S. BEATEN BY U. OF O. FRESHMEN

Indian Quintet Hopelessly Outclassed in Battle Resulting 40 to 22.

The Roseburg Senior high school Indians were beaten 40 to 22 in a high speed game of basketball here Saturday night with the University of Oregon freshmen. Hopelessly outclassed in height, weight, age and experience, the Indians nevertheless put up a good battle, playing a brilliant defensive game.

The frosh led 12 to 1 at the end of the first quarter and 17 to 7 at the half. In the second half the Indians, unable to penetrate the frosh defense, opened up with a long range attack, Bannister, Doucette and Scherner being successful in converting long shots.

Bannister played an exceptionally strong defensive game, while Doucette was also brilliant in the guard position.

Both teams made frequent substitutions due to the tiring pace of the game.

Johanson led the scoring for the visitors with 8 points, while Phelps and Smith were tied with 7 each for the frosh.

The university team was lacking the services of Gale, star center. Gale went to his home at Oakridge Saturday morning and was unable to return to Eugene because of high water blocking the road. Gale is a former resident of Roseburg.

Bill Campbell, of Roseburg, former high school star, played the greater part of the game with the frosh and made an excellent defensive showing.

STORM CONDITIONS LOCALLY ARE BAD

of 5.31 inches for the entire month. The rain has been almost continuous since the first of the month, although varying in intensity from occasional light showers to prolonged downpours.

A storm of unusual severity occurred Sunday evening.

The heavy rainfall started at about 3:30 o'clock and continued without interruption until 9:30 p. m. during which time the local weather bureau station recorded 1.25 inches of rain.

Other showers occurred at 1:00, 3:00 and 4:00 a. m. today but were not as copious as the 6-hour downpour Sunday.

South Umpqua Booming
The heavy precipitation, which was general over the entire county brought the South Umpqua river to high flood stage. In many of the lower sections bordering the river, homes are threatened, and residents have bathered belongings preparatory to forced removal.

Indications, early this afternoon, however, were that the water was receding.

The North Umpqua river dropped this morning from the 9.5 to the 9.1 mark during a period of about five hours.

At Sutherlin, susceptible to flooding, due to poor drainage, water last night flowed over the curbs in the business district, and flooded many store buildings.

Roseburg streets were also overflowing with water in many places Sunday evening during the center of the heavy downpour. Members of the city street department changed courses of water draining from the hill side districts on the east side of town, however, and prevented any serious damage.

The road conditions caused the greatest concern throughout the county.

Slide Near Camas
The Roseburg-Cooms Bay highway is blocked by a serious slide, seven miles west of Camas Valley. The first estimates were that the slide contains at least 1500 yards of rock and dirt. Dan Plowman, superintendent of the Bradford CCC camp, assigned 50 men to aid the highway crews in clearing the slide, and a power shovel was sent from the maintenance station at Coquille. It was thought possible that the road might be cleared sufficiently to restore traffic by a late hour tonight.

No report was received by the division office of the state highway department here regarding the extent of the slide on the Umpqua highway between Drain and Reedsport, but the Salem office has announced that the road may be closed to traffic for the greater part of the present week. Several minor slides were reported in addition to the large slide near Elkton.

On the secondary highway between Sutherlin and Elkton a bridge was washed out by high water in Dodge canyon, while there

are also several slides in that district.

Main Highway Open
The Pacific highway, although flooded in several places, was open to travel this afternoon, the local highway office reported, and the Willamette river was said to be falling, in a report received from Eugene.

The Oregon coast highway was reported to be under 6 feet of water between Coquille and Bandon.

County roads are open for the most part, in the South Deer creek section is closed, due to a bridge washing out, while the Custer bridge near Tenmile was taken out by high water. Both were small bridges.

Homes of Frank Johnson, Ira Pierce and Kenneth Dunham, at the south end of Ballf avenue in West Roseburg were endangered this morning by a slide from Mt. Nebo. A spring opened up near the summit of the mountain, and, coupled with drainage water, carried tons of mud, trees, logs and rock down the hill side and across the old Military wagon road into yards surrounding the three homes.

Men worked furiously to change the course of the mud flow and finally managed to turn it to unimproved land before major damage was done to any of the residence buildings.

Mud Delays Train
At Dillard a mud slide about 20 feet in width and two feet in depth covered the S. P. tracks, holding up the southbound passenger train for approximately four hours. The slide was cleared away, however, and the train proceeded at 7:55 a. m.

Public utilities have maintained service despite severe handicaps. Crews are toiling to maintain Copco power lines.

In the Rows river district east of Cottage Grove, the water surrounds the power poles, but so far no damage has resulted, the local Copco office is informed. Several secondary lines are out of commission in the Roseburg area.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at the Christian church in Riddle, with interment in the Riddle cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of the Roseburg Undertaking company.
