BOMBING OF CHURCH LAID TO ITALIANS

The death or wounding of ten Ethiopians in a church at Sakota, in Northern Ethiopia, and the bombing of ten others by Italian aerial bombs was claimed today in official Ethiopian quarters.

A communique from Dessayo, where Emperor Haile Selassie has established field headquarters, said fascist war planes wrecked the Church of St. Mary in Sakota on Jan. 10, and that the town was being bombed daily.

Fascist patrols which surprised an Ethiopian commissary column in the Tembien sector captured 1,000 bags of provisions.

Italian dispatches reported 500 mutineers from Ras Mulugheta's army had been hanged and 100 flogged as dissatisfaction spread through the Ethiopian ranks.

Ethiopian officials said several Italian prisoners taken to Dessayo had testified that native Italian troops in the north "officially were ordered to burn churches."

Stringer was jointly accused with Ralph Tremaine, still sought in the Pacific northwest.
